DONE TO DEATH BY BLACK HAND

Revelsok Man Treacherously Murdered by Three Strangers Who Escaped—Body Concealed in Underbrush

ASKED HIS AID IN FINDING LAND

Victim of Crime Well Known as Opponent of Black Hand Gangs—Expected to be Killed by Them

REVELSOK, Sept. 24.—Another crime has been added to the long chain credited to the Black Hand in Canada by the murder of Frank Julien on Wednesday morning. His body was found in thick underbrush along the Illecillewaet river.

On Tuesday evening the three strangers called at Julien's house, but were not seen by members of the household, Julien meeting them personally and discussing work for the following day. On Wednesday morning Julien left home about 8.30 for the scene of operations, was met by the three strangers and proceeded through the bush for the purpose of showing the land to them.

On Thursday night, anxious over his long absence, they started to look for him, aided by the family. One saw him, his son-in-law, Damer, and others searched till dark. Search resumed Friday morning, resulting in the finding of the body by Constable, who reported to the police.

Julien leaves a wife, five daughters and two sons.
