VANCOUVER HELD

ST. PATS TO A TIE

Lehman Appears in Goal for Pacific Coast Title Holders Again.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 5.—No decision was reached in the third game of the western tour of the world's champions St. Pats of Toronto, the score being 3 to 3 in the game with the Vancouver Maroons here last night. It was decided not to play overtime.

The easterners gave a wonderful display of hockey, but were strongest on defence. Roach, in the Toronto goal, was the star of the evening, stopping two dozen sure shots from the aggressive Vancouver forwards, who were in top form and showed the advantage which their extra two weeks of training has given them.

Randall was the best of the Toronto forwards, two of St. Pat's goals being credited to his stick. It was hockey from gong to gong, fast and clean and heady, with 8,000 fans on their feet most of the time.

After five years Frank Patrick came back last night and showed he has not forgotten how to shoot. One goal and one assist went to his credit. Another old timer on the Vancouver line-up was "Cyclone" Taylor, who played a good game and made several fine shots but met up with Roach and failed to score.

BASKET BALL.

The Assembly Hall of the Grammar School was the scene of a spirited game of basketball on Friday evening last when the Grade X boys matched their skill against that of the grade XI basket ball five. The contest was clean and fast.

The play opened fast and continued without a lull during the entire first period. The game was closely contested but by steady efforts the grade X boys got a lead of two goals before the period ended. The score stood 8-10. But when the second period opened the older fellows executed some fast play which enabled them to tie the score. The play from then on was probably faster than before for the Grade X fellows seemed determined to win and they finally did, by putting over two more goals before time was up.

Mr. J. R. Vallis refereed to the satisfaction of the boys. Only four penalties were necessary during the entire game. Another match is expected shortly.

Dominion has been exceptional; wholesale trade has increased in volume, and the number of unemployed has steadily decreased throughout the year, but, notwithstanding, the fact remains, Mr. Howland declared, that the activities of the country are not being carried on at a profit and capital is not being accumulated therefrom. Savings are diminishing; there is no real reduction in the debt of the Dominion, and there are increases in those of Provinces and municipalities; taxes have increased; neither retail trade or collections of any two goods, and there is comparatively little immigration. "Although," he said, "I fear that we have some distance to go before we reach that stretch of level road that leads to general prosperity."

How to remedy the defects of the present system, how to quicken the veins of industry and stimulate the main arteries of commerce are the problems that remain to be solved. Mr. Howland offered several constructive suggestions, emphasizing the need of a policy to encourage immigrants of the properly selected sort, placed on where they can maintain themselves and thus be unlikely of becoming a burden to the country; restriction of public expenditures; economy on the part of the individual; careful adjustment of taxation; a fiscal policy the aim of which is to cheapen the cost of living; the cessation of legislation of a summary or paternal character, and a prosperous Europe which can only be hastened by a disposition on the part of nations to further instead of hinder.

Upon consideration of these suggestions from an unbiased viewpoint one can but deduct the conclusion that they are founded on logical reasoning. But, alas, the world's progress towards normal prosperity has, undoubtedly been greatly hampered because of the obstacles of labor inefficiency, high wages, restricted markets and immigration and a chaotic Europe. When laborers and the labor parties have abandoned revolutionary tactics and have become less com-

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY

WON FOOTBALL HONORS

Defeated Edmonton Eskimos 13-1 Westerners Display Some Skill.

Kingston, Ont., Dec. 4.—Queen's University football team, more Canadian champions. In a great struggle here Saturday they defeated the Edmonton Eskimos 13 to 1. It was a wonderful game in which the Westerners gave a display of skill and knowledge of the finer points of Canadian rugby which surprised the Easterners, and early in the play made many of the big college speedsters think the honors were due for a trip to the prairies. The visitors had the better of the first half, which ended one to nothing in their favor. After that, Queen's seemed to find themselves and led by 8 to 1 at the end of the third quarter. The Eskimos were again this year strong in line plunges, but their back division was not fast enough for the collegians.

SPORTING BRIEFS.

At Paris on Saturday night Eugene Crippe, the French lightweight champion, settled all arguments as to the featherweight title of Europe by decisively defeating Billy Matthews, of England, in the seventeenth round, when the referee stopped the fight to save Matthews from further punishment.

The affair surrounding Siki, the big Senegalese prize fighter, who won the light heavyweight championship of the world by defeating Georges Carpentier but recently had his title taken away from him by boxing federation and also was denied the right to engage in pugilistic contests for nine months, is to be thrashed out before the Paris courts.

Amherst News.—The fact that Fred J. Somers has been elected president of the Independent Hockey League, will be a pleasing announcement to the hockey fans and the hockey fans in Moncton, Amherst, New Glasgow, and Stellarton, but particularly so in Sydney, Glace Bay and North Sydney, where Mr. Somers is extremely well known. For a number of years Mr. Somers was connected with the Sydney Millionaires, and one might safely say that all his life he has taken a profound interest in hockey.

Queen's University players by defeating the Edmonton Eskimos 13-1 at Kingston Saturday are the undisputed Sydney, Glace Bay and North Sydney.

The Club Batting Record for the 1922 season shows Pittsburgh to be the leading club in batting, with a three-point advantage over the World's champion Giants. St. Louis made the most total bases, on 2,411; Pittsburgh made the most one-base hits, 250. Philadelphia led in home runs with 116, and Pittsburgh in triples with 110. Chicago led in number of sacrifice hits, and Pittsburgh in stolen bases. New York made most football champions of Canada.

The Official Batting Records of National League players, for the season of 1922 show that Lou Gehrig of St. Louis, for the third successive year, won the individual batting championship with a percentage of .401, being the highest mark since Ed Delahanty led the league in 1899 with .408. Horne also won the season's major league home run honors with 52, and a new National League record of 250 hits during the season, thus breaking the record held by Willie Keeler, who made 243 hits in 1897.

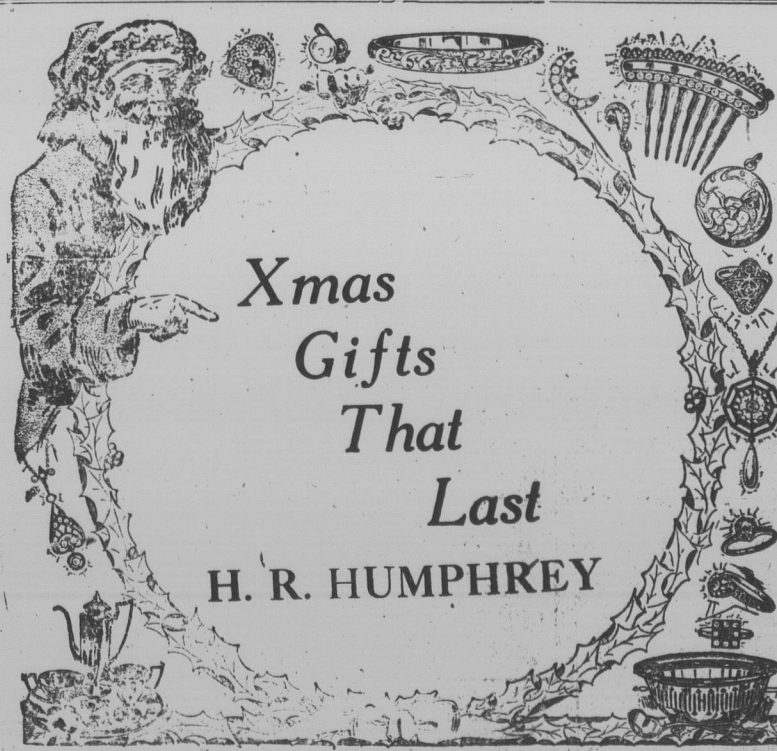
