Milk Fever in Cows.

A Massachusetts farmer of large experience in the care of diary stock contributes to the Lewiston Journal the following good advice regarding the prevention of milk fever in cows: The cows most subject to this disease are the best and largest milkers; if quite fleshy, they are still more liable, and it occurs within three days

Characteristics of milk lever in cows:
