It was a generous act on the part of Britain in November 1869 to grant to Canada 2,200,000 square miles of country in the Northwest. A most generous gift it was, from a government that could trust her children. What did it mean? We must remember it is the greatest piece of grazing land and the largest strip of wheat land to be found in the world in one day. This Northwest and Canada, as well as the States, were designed by Providence for a special purpose—one we are actually beginning to arrive at. The men who ought to be silent are the most bitter—the workingmen who complain about immigrants coming here. The trades unions ought to be ashamed to formulate a policy so restrictive, unmanly and ungodly. The land was never ours to deny its fertile plains to those who come to seek a living. Of course it is right to resist the pauper element, but God kept this country for the downtrodden masses of foreign nations. He took it from Russia, Spain and France, and he will take it from us if we shut ourselves up and crow with a sort of pride that has grown up in our very poverty. They will want shoes, coats, books, [school-masters—and preachers, and the more that come the

preachers, and the more that come the more we will have to do. It is a short-sighted policy to oppose their coming.

Although Manitoba enjoys great privileges such as no other government has even given to a province, yet how they grumble! They ought to thank God that things are well with them. Talk of rebellion? Men who are so ungrateful ought to be buried. All rebellion, however, is at an end both here and in the States. It will be fruitless work to divide Israel's territory. This grumbling has an injurious effect on the people themselves by keeping out those who would make good citizens. While they grumble for increased privileges they are curtailing their own. Both the pulpit and press have to a great degree lost their power over the masses of mankind. Once the pulpit was first in public opinion; then a reflector, but now you hear the sepulchral wailings of a lonely past not applicable to the present. The press has lost its power—by injudicious partmership. Once they formed public sentiment, but now they have degenerated so as to neither reflect nor lead current ideas. This criticism applies to our leading journals. They do not show what our national sentiments are; they do not tell the truth by a long way, but their editorial columns pertain to dead issues of a partizan character that manifests itself in personal abuse.
