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THE SNEEZING EPIDEMIC.

AN Unwelcome Visitor at Christmastide—Every Quarter of a Century—Is Extended Area—Really Cosmopolitan—All Regions Seem to Be Come Here Really—What the Doctors Say.

About every twenty-five or thirty-five years great epidemics of influenza have swept over vast areas of the globe, and less widely extended epidemics have taken place with greater or less frequency in the intervals of the great outbreaks...

The British Medical Journal brought by the last mail contains an extended editorial upon the epidemic now prevailing in Europe, and recalls the great outbreak of influenza that occurred in London forty and fifty years ago. The journal says:

Influenza is of all epidemic diseases that which attacks the largest number of people with a given short time. The estimate of the number of persons who are attacked in a quarter of the whole population of London during the epidemic of 1832-33 is said to be 1,000,000.
