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ARTICLE XVI.—Note upon the Genus Graptolithus, and description of some remarkable new forms from the shales of the Hudson River Group, discovered in the investigations of the Geological Survey of Canada, under the direction of Sir W. GRAPTOLITHUS HEADI.

Description.—Frond robust, four-branched; disk large, subquadrangular, moderately extended along the branches; branches strong, much elongated, sub-angular exteriorly; serratures small, acute, from twenty-two to twenty-four in an inch; fine distinctly marked strike extend from the base of the serratures nearly across the branch.

The specimen described presents the disk, which in its diameter across the centre between the branches is nearly one inch and an eighth, or nine-sixteenths of an inch on each side of the centre; while from the centre to its extent along the branches it varies from about three-fourths of an meh in one branch to an inch in another. The substance of the disk is strong and somewhat rugose, either from its original character or from the accidents ac-
