#### CUBRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

"The lumber market is steady, and, if anything, inclined to be a little stronger. There is not the slightest indication of weakness, and I look for higher prices this winter." This was the opinion given by a large manufacturer of white pine, and seems to be an expression of the prevailing sentiment in the trade. Considering the quantity of lumber manufactured this season, the stock yet unsold represents but a small percentage, as most of the water mills have made large shipments by vessel to the United States. The opinion of manufacturers on the Georgian Bay regarding the future of the market is very hopeful, particularly in view of the proposed limited operations in the woods during the coming winter. The manufac-turers who have most faith in the market are asking from \$14 to \$16 for box and common, \$12 for 1x10 and 12 mill culls, and corresponding prices for other grades. The higher qualities of pine are held very firm. Owing to a large production of red pine during the past two years, that lum ber has declined slightly in price, but it is almost certain that during the coming winter the cut of red pine logs will be small, and in our opinion holders of such stock should make no sacrifice, as all the lumber will find a market at reasonable prices. For No. 1 lath \$2.50 is being asked at Georgian Bay mills, and for No. 2 \$2, while in the Ottawa valley \$2.25 to \$2.50 and \$1.75 to \$2 are the prevailing prices. The scarcity of shingles continues. As much as \$2.40 is being asked by some manufacturers for the best grade

of pine. The hardwood market is quite featureless, the only noticeable change being some increased buying by the implement and furniture factories. At the mills \$13 is asked for inch mill run soft elm, \$15 for birch, \$13 for maple, and \$20 for oak.

#### QUEBBC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The shipments of lumber from the St. Lawrence during the past week have been light. It is hoped that this will continue until the close of navigation, as great precaution on the part of shippers is necessary in order that the British market may not be further depressed. The low freight rates are an inducement to send lumber forward. Quebec spruce deals are quite firm, and shippers on this side are not willing to offer any concessions to buyers. Manufacturers in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are also showing more confidence, partly owing to the heavy demand from South America and some demand from Australia, France and other countries to which shipments have not usually been large. Clapboards are in better demand for shipment to the United States. Extra cedar shingles are firmly held at \$3, but clears are a litte easier at \$2.65. It is probable that some of the St. John saw mills will be compelled to close down on account of a scarcity of logs, some of the drives not having arrived.

#### UNITED STATES.

The past week has been comparatively quiet in lumber circles throughout the United States, shipments showing a falling off on account of a shortage of cars to move the stock. The shipments of white pine so far, this season have been very heavy. Up to September 1 there was shipped from Minneapolis 46,000,000 fect more than during the corresponding period of last year. It is reported that fewer buyers are now visiting the Lake Superior district, although several million feet of lumber were sold last week to Chicago and eastern points. At Marinette, Wis., there is practically no pine for sale, but there is considerable hardwoods on the docks unsold. The receipts of lumber at Buffalo and Tonawanda were heavy during August, the former receiving by vessel 63,000,000 feet and the latter 81,000,000 feet. A considerable quantity has yet to come forward from the Upper Lakes. There is a good. movement of the higher grades of pine and an improved demand for box lumber. which during the summer months showed
