Roast, F.C.S., gives a course of lectures in one branch of Metallurgy in Dr. Stansfield's Department, and Mr. Charles F. Pascoe, F.C.I.C., also give a course of special lectures to extension classes in the same Department of McGill University. These gentlemen now propose to go into partnership as Consulting Metallurgists and Chemists, and they have requested Dr. Stansfield to become a member of the firm. The firm would be known as Messrs. Stansfield, Roast & Pascoe, Consulting Metallurgists & Chemists, and the work will lie particularly in connection with advice on electrical furnaces, chemico-legal investigations, ferrous, non-ferrous and electro-metallurgy, and analytical chemistry. Dr. Stansfield informs me that he would like to become a partner of the firm in question, and that he will undertake to see that any time which he devotes to it will not in any way impair his teaching efficiency or the efficiency of his Department.
