Dear Sir,

In connection with the draft curriculum which was forwarded to you yesterday, I would suggest the following changes in the draft report.

Page 4, strike out everything after number 6 "c", and substitute the following:-

"A draft is hereto attached as schedule "A".

"In preparing this draft the requirements of the Bar as to the number of lectures to be given in each subject have been ignored and in consequence it is not possible to put the suggested curriculum into effect until the existing Bar By-Laws have been amended. Your committee expresses no opinion as to whether it is feasible to obtain an amendment to the By-Laws at the present time but thinks that steps should be taken quietly to ascertain whether the time is now ripe to approach the General Council for this purpose. Realizing that this may take some time, your committee submits an alternative curriculum Schedule "B", adapting that contained in Schedule "A" to the existing Bar regulations. It recommends that this alternative curriculum (Schedule "B") be adopted until such time as the Bar regulations are modified. A table showing lectures now given, Bar requirements and those proposed to be given, is appended as Schedule "C".

Page 5, strike out balance of paragraph continued from previous page.

Page 7, strike out everything after first paragraph and substitute the following:-

"Much remains to be done in working out the details of the suggested readings in the various courses and in other matters, and it would in consequence be impracticable, even if desirable, to bring the changes recommended into effect with the class entering the Faculty next autumn (1925). There appears, however, to be no reason why the necessary work cannot be done in the course of next winter, and it is therefore recommended that the changes be put into effect with the class entering the University in the autumn of 1926.
