Professor Roe, the Rev. John Kemp, B.D., and the Rev. W. King, St. Sylvester, were in attendance on his Lordship, and took part in the service; there was a large number of communicants.

In connection with our Sunday School work, I may mention a very successful pic-nic for the Sunday School children, held in September, on Mr. Thomas Witton's grounds, near the Church. It was largely attended by the members of the congregation, and greatly enjoyed by all, especially the young people. Mrs. Dr. Reed, Mrs. Austin, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lyster took an active part in making all go off pleasantly. This may seem a small matter to some, but it has been a great event in our quiet little Mission.

St. Stephens' Church, the only Church in our Mission, has been enlarged by adding to its length 12 feet, and a small vestry, at a cost of about \$150. The people in the Mission have subscribed \$50, the Messrs. King Brothers \$50, and I have undertaken to collect the balance. This addition has very much improved the appearance of the little old Church, and when finished, (the painting is left over till the spring) will be a great comfort and convenience to the congregation. I think it right to state that Mr. W. J. Smythe, a prominent member of the congregation, took the leading part in this work, for which he deserves the thanks of all the members of the Church here. Honour to whom honour is due.

This Mission is especially indebted to Mr. James and Mr. Charles King for their liberality in paying so largely towards the support of this Mission; indeed it is admitted by all, and may be truly recorded here, that the Mission could not be kept open, under the arrangement with the Diocesan Board, were it not for their large contributions to the assessment; they are worthy sons of their late father, who did so much for the support of the Mission during his lifetime.

There are a number of young people being prepared for confirmation. The Bishop had intended to hold a confirmation at St. Stephens when on his tour in the early part of December, but the Church was then being enlarged, and we were not able to hold the service.
