this Jubilee, doing full duty, with as much vigor and efficiency as they ever possessed. Many of the office-bearers have had long terms of service. Mr. J. P. Henderson has been in office as Deacon or Elder for forty-six years; Mr. William Harvie has been in office as Deacon or Elder for forty-six years; Mr. George A. Chase has been a Manager or Deacon, for twenty-five years; Mr. Melville Millar, with the exception of a few years absence in Peterborough, has been a Manager or Deacon for thirty years; Dr. Beaton has been a Manager or Elder for twenty-five years; William Thomson, (Longford), has been continuously a Manager for nearly twenty years; Mr. H. Cooke has held the position of Sabbath School Superintendent continuously for twenty-one years, and Mr. C. J. Miller, that of Assistant-Superintendent, for the same length of time. Several younger men, and others, who have recently become connected with the congregation, have held official positions for terms ranging from seven to twelve years.

A gratifying and hopeful feature of our church life is the interest taken in congregational and other Christian work by many of our young people. A large proportion of our membership is composed of the young, and many of them are doing excellent work in various lines of Christian service. The problem of keeping the young in their own church, and of getting them to take an interest in the work and worship of their own congregation has never given us any trouble. Many of our working staff professed their faith, for the first time, in the congregation in which they are now rendering efficient service.

The Sabbath School room, with the exception of the part annexed from the old church, was built by the Sabbath School.
