### THOMPSON WAS EASY

NEWARK, July 8.—Atchison and his portside fling was too much for the Skeeters in the game at Newark today, while Thompson's slants were pie for the Indians, hence the latter won, 7 to 0. Buffalo, July 8.—(Special.)—Perhaps Buffalo has a ball team; we don't know. At any rate, no indication of it has cropped out in the last day or two. Since last Saturday, when old reliable Mains kept the Bisons in the lead with his mighty right arm, there has been nothing to it but Toronto, and the local fans fail to understand why the club shouldn't be well towards the top. Certainly they are showing up the Heat by playing all-round smasher ball, especially with the willow, which they wield in good, old-fashioned form, and usually at opportune times.

As Brown was the master of the situation yesterday, so was Lush the whole show today, allowing but seven safeties, and these well distributed that in only two innings did Buffalo have a chance to score. This happened in the third, when a single followed a two-base away, bringing in one run, and in the sixth, when the second was marked up on an error, a base on balls and a safe bingle, the final being 6 to 2 for Kelley.

Toronto's came in all in one round, the fourth, when six husky Canadians chased each other around the circuit. The leather was hit so hard and often at this time that it was like a Fort Erie horse race, and the fans were betting which would get around first. Every man on the team faced Fullenweider, and Shultz appeared twice for good measure. The slaughter followed from seven hits, three of which were for an extra base, and two sacrifices. Evidently Manager Clymer was taking his afternoon nap at this critical stage, for poor old Fullenweider was left on the mound, sweat running from every pore, until nine of the grain sits had sampled his offerings and found them to their liking. Some little bee must have stung Clymer after all his bombardment, for he suddenly came to life and gave the signal which gave the needed relief to the long-suffering Fullenweider. Jamieson, who had been warming up all through the trouble, was rushed into the breach, and the misery was ended with no further damage. From then on the visitors were held in perfect submission. Altho they played a very busy game before the curtain dropped, they came one in each session, and counted for naught.

W. Bradley, the veteran third-baseman, was compelled to drop his cap and make his best bow when he first appeared at the plate in the second inning. A party of Cleveland city officials were in Buffalo today and occupied boxes near the visitors' bench. When Bradley grasped his bat and walked to the front he was met by the Cleveland delegation who presented him with a handsome black traveling bag in recognition of the time when he once wore the Nap uniform. A young cheer was given for the best third-baseman in the world. Northern was on first, and Bradley smiled his thanks and stepped to the plate, and after a mighty swing popped a little foul, which fell into the waiting mitt of Lalonde.
