

### RAILWAY OPERATING **COSTS MUCH MORE**

Officials of G.T.R. and C.P.R. Lines Submit Figures to Ottawa Commission

Canadian Press Despatch. OTTAWA, March 1 .- An idea of the ncrease in operatingg expenses on the C. P. R. and G. T. R. from 1909 to 1914 was conveyed to the railway commission by E. W. Beatty, vice-president and general counsel of the C. P. R., and Howard Kelly, vice-president of

and general counsel of the C. P. R., and Howard Kelly, vice-president of the G. T. R.

They submitted to the board figures showing additions to the wage, coal, rallway ties, and other bills. Counsel for the government asserted that it was opposed to an increase in the rates under present conditions.

According to Mr. Kelly, \$12,961,903 was paid out in wages to the G. T. R. employes for the 5.336,766 days which they worked in 1909. For 1914 the total wage bill was \$15,967,141 for 5.475.802 worked, an increase of \$3,005,238. Trainmen benefited the best, he stated. The engineers aid not get as generous treatment, but telegraph operators were given an advance, and firemen obtained an increase of 78 cents per day.


Rallway ties had advanced in price during the past five years. Last year the increased cost in ties alone represented an expenditure of \$35,803. Coal meant a dead-weight increase in 1914 when compared with 1909. There was a total increase in operating expenses for last year over 1909 of \$3,832,733.

Even more remarkable were the figures given by Mr. Beatty, covering a period from 1909 to 1914. In that time the total increase was about \$31,000,000, the comparative figures being \$60,397,000 for 1909, and \$81,701,000 for last year. Wages entailed an extra expenditure in the five years of \$7,981,143. Some items showed that in 1909 conductors were paid \$998,000, compared with \$1,147,558, an increase of \$1559,863.
