UNITED STATES

There seems no likelihood of an early charge in the remarkable condition of the lumber trade of the United States. The incidents of the past work have boom in the direction of further strengthening' the hands of the holder of lumber. Several large purchases of white pine have recently hose made in the Lake Superioralistrict. It is estimated that 150,000,000 feet of the proposed cut on the Menominee river has already been sold. In Chicago all grades of lumber are moving actively. Piece stuff bridge \$16.75 delivered in that city. Throughout the Eastern States there is a general complaint of a scarcity of box" lumber, and there is a tendency to advance prices on all the coarser items. It is said that the supply of bex, still culis, and 6 and 13-inch barn boards is so small at Tongwards that they are likely to be out of the market before new stack are rives. There is a splendid demand for Norway lumber, "C" and butthe bidag quoted at \$40. Michigan manufacturers have made another advance in the price of homlock lumber, for which the demand is much heavier than is usual at this season of the year. Some dealers are shipping green stock to fill their orders.

The entire hardwood list has been helped by the strong position of basewood. The Wisconsin Hardwood Lumbermen's ciation has changed its quotations on this lumber, making an advance of \$1 from the list adopted March agth. The present prices are as follows, I. o. b. Waymu: 1-inch tets and ands clear basewood. 5 to 21 inches, 8 to 26 feet, \$33; 13/ to 136 inch, \$35; 2 inch, \$37. White a also stronger, while maple and soft cim sing scarce. Good quartered white oak is selling in the basters market at \$70, while one year ago it could be bought for \$44

The shingle situation is saliblactory except in respect to Washington red cadárs. At a meeting of the Washington Shingle Manufacturers' Association, held last week, it was decided to restrict the production, and it is the general opinion that about two hundred of the Washington salls will be closed down for an indefinite period.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Reports received respecting the condition of the British market are so what at variance. Shippers claim that they have succeeded in placing large stocks at their asking prices, while from other sources comes the information that importers have as yet bought sparingly d that they are not inclined to fall in with the views of shippers as to prices. It is perhaps near the mark to nave that less than the usual quantity of Canadian lumber has been placed this season with British buyers. The outlook, however, is by no means discouraging, as stocks are as a rale in a healthy condition. There are practically so wide pine deals held in first hands, and shipments are taken at prices ranging from £32 to £39 per standard. The statistical position of red pine is favorable. Taking the Glasgow market as an example, the stock on hand March 31st of this year was 1,140,000 feet, as compared with over 4,000,000

fest at corresponding period last year. Odotations range from Ly 38 to Les per andard. Wasty and square pine timber have appreciated in value, 18 to 19 inch ittney being held at 30 gd to 44 per cubic Soot, and first-class square pine, 35 to 40 feet average, at as gd to gs. First-class rock aim is in good demand, but the week of soft eim is large and prices correspondingly low. Birch is in better inquiry, 15 and 16 inch average ranging front 19 to sid per cubic fost.

STOCKS AND PRICE:.

The City of Winnipeg is asking ter-unders up to April 28th for supply of lumber,

J. D. Carew, of Lindsay, Ont., has received a drive of 10,000 logs from Scugog Labo. Other delvise are on the way from the Squaw River and Nogey's Creek.

The Rathbun Company have received the contract to supply lumber for the City of Mingston at \$25.35 per thousand fee! and codor for stringers at 3 costs per runnine foot.

The New Brusswick government will offir for sale at Predericton, on April sand, four timber berthe, as follows: 2 et on west branch Sabbles River. Bernard D. McCormick, applicant; 256 q. miles at mouth of Six Mile Breck, Calu's River, W. H. Murray, applicant; 6 oq. miles, north-west of Salmon River, W. H. Murray, applicant.

Owing to the early break-up of the logide in New Brunswick, W. J. Scott. rating on the Keewick river, was obliged to leaver 4,000 logs in the woods. Secnators for Donald France & Sons and the Tobique Manufacturing Compa re reported to have also left large quantities of legs in the woods.

According to the United States Consul, the exports of inesber to the United States during the three months suding March 3: were valued at \$185,426.38. Of this count \$94,616.03 represented Maine lumfactured at St. John, and \$90,-812.55 provincial lumber. Of the New swick production long lumber was valued at \$10,359.90 and lath at \$25,922.27. Pulp exports represented \$53,500.26, or more than half of the total New Brusewick preduct.

In the Chicago market tierce hoops are firm in price and scarce, quotations ranging from \$15.30 to \$16, while pork hoops are quoted from \$:1 to \$12. In stack cosperage stocks are light and demand not urgent. Basswood heading for flour arrels is quoted at about 5% cents a set, with segar barrel heading at 616 cents. The high price of hardwood lumber is making it difficult for purchasers of slack barral stock to secure material with which to fall their orders.

Under date of March 18th, S. P. Musson, Son & Company refer to the Barbadoes lumber market as follows: "There has been no arrival of either white pine or spruce during the fortnight, but a mixed

sarero of about 20,000 feet shipping and 50,000 feet second quality white pide, 40,000 thipping bemlock and 20,000 feet second quality spruce, said to be near by. has been sold at \$36, \$21, \$19 and \$18 respectively. Consumption is only underate, and although stocks are not large there is not much inquiry, the impression boing that prices will decline later on. There is hardly any inquiry for shingles."

Continued raise is the province of New Brusswick have caused freshets and resulted in considerable damage to logging booms. The boom at the mouth of the Nashwaak tiver gave way and 500,000 feet of logs belonging to Jas. M. Scott; of Dubfries, west adult in the river. Most of them have been recovered, but at consid rable expense. James Humphray, of Moncton, lost 1,000,000 feet of loss and the top of his mill dam was washed away. By the breaking of the boom at Apphagel, 5,000 logs belonging to Jenes Bres. went adrift. A. H. Peck, of Hepowell-Hill, soffered a slight loss in the same manner.

A better movement of shingles at North Tonewands has not been noted this year, domand being exceptionally good. Red cedars are being gested at 10' cents' less than a week ago, attributed to a surplus and the disposition of consensors to secure other shingles that may be brught for less money. White pine manufacturers are re-ported nominated behind in orders. There is a fair rapply of them with dealers but the excellent movement makes more of their most desirable; consequently orders are being placed with producers right

A scargity of dry hardwood is restricting the movement to consumers. During the month of March, says the Missholppi Valley Lumberman, a larger quantity was sold and shipped than in the the three preceding months, and supplies of the snort destroble woods have been reduced to unstered cak continue extremely high, and for the time being there is little propact of any reduction. Coustron and cult are being absorbed more readily and \$38 to \$40 is obtained. A scarpity of hees of Problem addens boowseston and analysis obtained high prices, and cottonwood box france have sold up to \$44, and cults at \$23, free on board, Cairon The top price paid on basewood at Wisconsin points is Sas for firsts and seconds.
