This Council of War ought not, however, to be look'd upon in the same Light as some of those Councils of Peace which have been held upon our European Expeditions. Had Holborne inconfiderately risqued a Battle with the Enemy, he might, in all human Probability, have been conquered, and the Consequences of that Defeat would have been terrible indeed: The Transports, with upwards of ten Thousand Land-Forces on board, would have been taken or destroyed, and New York, and perhaps North America, had been lost in Consequence of that Event. The Courage of the Admiral was never doubted. After the Land-Forces were dismissed, he was determined himself to see the Strength of the E 2 Enemy:
