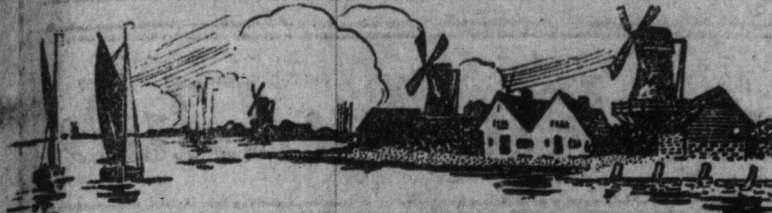

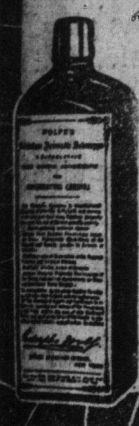

Grain Blockade On at Buffalo

Fifty Million Bushels of Export
Grain Contained in Long Line
of Waiting Vessels.

BUFFALO, Dec. 13.—(Can. Press.)—
Three miles of giant freighters, their
hulls filled with millions of bushels of
grain, are riding at anchor inside the
breakwater of Buffalo's outer harbor
today, forming one of the heaviest
blockades of grain in the history of
the port.
Fifty-three vessels in this line carry

cargoes aggregating 15,000,000 bushels
of export grain, practically all of it
being wheat. In the inner harbor are
twenty more vessels and a like num-
ber is expected to become unavailing.
The total cargo value of the fleet in
winter quarters here is estimated at
\$2,000,000. The grain will be trans-
shipped at the rate of 500 to 1000 car-
loads a day during the winter and the
remainder will be shipped by canal in
the spring.
The Christopher, the vanguard of
the fleet en route here with Canadian
grain from Fort William, Ont., arrived
today covered with ice. She reported
black weather and hard blows on the
way down.

The annual commencement
of the Humber College
institute were held in the auditorium of
the school yesterday afternoon and
proved to be the most successful ever
held in the college's history. The
assembly hall, which was decorated in
the school colors for the occasion, was
completely filled with the pupils and
friends of the school.

The proceedings were somewhat un-
ique in that all the principal speakers
of the afternoon were in some way at
some time connected with the school.
Dr. J. T. Gilmore, warden of Central
Prison, was the first chairman of the
Toronto Junction High School Board.
Dr. F. J. Conboy, chairman of the
board of education, an old boy and
graduate of the school, and Prof. J. C.
Robertson of Victoria College was the
first principal in the old Toronto Junc-
tion days.

Dr. Conboy in his address referred
humorously to some of his experiences
when a pupil of the school, and then
presented the scholars to the scholars
who were successful at the recent de-
partmental examinations. Dr. Gil-
mour spoke in the most laudable terms
of the present magnificent modern
building, saying that the condition of
the school now justified his belief and
prophecy of years ago. "At that time,"
said he, "they called the building we
erected, the best we could afford. Gil-
mour's folly; now we have it enlarged
to twice the size with an attendance
of nearly 400." Prof. Robertson spoke
in a reminiscent strain also and re-
ferred to the present condition of the
school as his "dream come true."

The valedictory of the graduating
class was read by Edgar W. Pyke, who
last summer won the 2nd Mary Mus-
koke scholarship in classics. The re-
port of the principal, F. C. Colbeck,
B.A., showed the school's position to
be an excellent one, both academically
and in point of attendance.
