Also Six-Man Hockey—Annual Meeting to Be Held.

The Toronto Hockey League, formerly known as the Beehive League, is now ready to receive applications for this year's membership. Teams are requested to organize at an early date so they may have their delegates present at the annual meeting Friday, Nov. 21, when the league will be re-affiliated with the Ontario Hockey Association.

The league will operate five series—senior, intermediate, junior, juvenile and midweek. The senior and intermediate have no age limit, while players in the junior series must be under 20 years of age. The juvenile series is for players under 16 years of age.

The fees for the different series are as follows: Senior, \$2 playing fee, \$2 deposit; intermediate, \$4 playing fee, \$2 deposit; juvenile, \$3 playing fee, \$2 deposit; midweek, \$2 playing fee, \$1 deposit.

Six-man hockey will be played all series with the three-man substitute rule in vogue.
