FREE COINAGE IS THE PROPER THING

Claim That the Country Has Been Injured by Maintaining Gold.

In this effort millions of debt have been created—bankers have been enabled to reap rich harvests, while the honest toiler has been reduced to pauperism.

The Electors Asked to Stalk All Questions Before This Great Question of Money—Will Support Bryan.

St. Louis, July 23.—The Committee on Resolutions of the silver convention completed its work this afternoon by adopting the platform and address to be presented to the electors.

First—The paramount issue at this juncture is the question of money. It is between the British gold standard, gold bonds and bank currency on the one side and the bi-metallic standard, gold and silver on the other.

Second, we demand that the government currency, and an American policy on the other. On this issue we declare ourselves to be in favor of the bi-metallic standard.

Third—We are unalterably opposed to the single gold standard, and demand the immediate return to the constitutional standard of gold and silver.

Fourth, we denounce the Democratic and Republican policies that seek to restrict the currency by means of interest-bearing United States bonds, to be sold on English and foreign markets, and thereby to establish an artificial policy that will produce an artificial medium to speedily increase the circulation of money.

Fifth—We demand such legislation as will prevent the destruction of the legal tender quality of any kind of money by private contract.

Sixth—We demand that the power to control and regulate a paper currency is inseparable from the power to coin, and hence that all currency intended to circulate as money should be issued by the government.

Seventh—We are unalterably opposed to the issue by the United States of interest-bearing bonds in lieu of money.

COULD NOT GET A QUORUM. THEIR LIVES IN GOD'S HAND WILL HOW MR. HARTY RETIRE?

Remarkable Parallel Miracles on Lake Ontario—William Darby and Jennie Thompson, of Toronto, Gave Up All Hope of Rescue when the Oars were Blown Away—George Stott and Mabel Glidden, of Port Hope, Drifted to the Bluffs Near Brighton—Sorrow is Supplanted by Joy in Four Families.

There has probably never been previously recorded two such parallel cases of dire danger and remarkable rescue on Lake Ontario as those of Wm. Darby and Jennie Thompson of Toronto and George Stott and Mabel Glidden of Port Hope, who, caught in the severe squall of Wednesday evening, spent the entire night rocked, not in the cradle of the deep, but tossed by the angry waves almost into the very teeth of death.

The story of how the two young people were caught in Wednesday evening's squall and carried out into the lake was told exclusively in yesterday's World. All night long had the distracted parents and friends of the missing girl patrolled the beach at Victoria Park, straining their eyes across the water, and hoping to catch a glimpse of something that would indicate the safety of their darling.
