REFUGEES FLOCKING BACK.

1898

Stream of Hungry Skeletons Which Presented a Dismal Sight.

Santiago de Cuba, July 17.—Since 4 o'clock this morning a stream of refugees has been pouring into the city, some naked and all hungry skeletons and footsore. Many had fallen by the wayside. The town of San-tiago presents a dismal sight. Most of the houses have been sacked and the stores have all been looted and nothing to eat can be had for love or money. In the streets of the city this morning, at the entrenchmodes at the breastworks and at every hundred feet or so of the barbed wire fences, were the living skeletons of Spanish soldiers. Among the arrivals to-day were the Ger-man, Japanese and Portuguese Consuls and their families, the British and French Con-suls having arrived day before yesterday. Gen, Pando was never here, but 3500 men from Manzanillo arrived on July 3, making the totak garrison here 7000. Santiago de Cuba, July 17.-Since 4 o'clock

The armament of the shore batteries of Santiago consists of five brass 6-inch muzzle loaders in the Morro fortifications, two 6-inch Hontorias from the cruiser Reina Mer-cedes, and three 21 centimetre mortars never used in the Socapa upper battery; two useless 21.continuetre mortars, two Scentinever used in the Socapa upper battery; two useless 21-centimetre mortars, two 8-centi-metre muzgle-loaders and four 8-centimetre field pieces in the Estrella battery, one 57-millimetre and one 25-millimetre Norden-feldt and one 37-millimetre Hotchkiss in the Socapa lower battery, and two 6-firch Hontorias, two 9-centimetre Krupps and two 15-centimetre mortars at Punta Corda. Four Spanish merchant steamers, the Mor-tora, the Reina de Los Angeles, the Tomas Brooks and the Mexico and the gunboat Al-varado are now in the harbor.

Market Place Sacked.

The market place has been sacked by the roops; 22,000 refugees are quartered at El Janey, 5000 at Firmeza and 5000 at Cuabi-tan, El Boniato and San Vicente, where they have been living for a fortnight. In They have been living for a formight. In one cars 500 were crowded into one build-ing, which was a regular pig sty, with a horrible stench. They used the water from the river where solled clothing was washed, and all manner of filth is floating The Spanish troops hald down their arms at 9 o'clock this morning. They will be camped two miles outside the city limits under guard, until their embarkation takes place. The docks are crowded by sncom-ing refugees in a starving condition, awa't-ing the arrival in the harbor of the Hed Cross Society's steamer State of Texas, as there are no catables to be bought in the city. The entrance of the refugees was quiet and peaceful. They viewed their quiet and peaceful. They viewed their ked homes philosophically as the forune of war.
