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# PUBLIC SCHOOLS OVERHEATED.

Said Dr. Noble Last Night - Much  
Business Done at the Meeting of  
the Public School Board.

At a meeting of the Public School Board  
yesterday evening several matters of im-  
portance were disposed of. A communi-  
cation was read from the Governor of Flori-  
da, inviting a couple of the cadet corps of  
the Toronto Public Schools to the conven-  
tion which is to be held at Tampa on  
Nov. 8. The Minister of Education also  
wrote endorsing the organization of cadet  
corps in the schools. Several communi-  
cations from teachers, caretakers, etc., thank-  
ing the board for appointments, were re-  
ceived. The Provincial Treasurer sent \$222  
on night school account and a letter was  
also received from Dr. Bryce, calling atten-  
tion to the finding of a conference of boards  
of health at Detroit in August last with re-  
gard to measures for the prevention of  
tuberculosis in schools and other public  
buildings.

Chairman Stephen Burns called the at-  
tention of the board to a pamphlet of Dr.  
J. O. Adams in 1896, dealing with the care  
of the teeth. Of 6000 children whose teeth  
were examined in 14 schools in the city,  
4000 were found to be suffering from and  
2000 were detained from school on account  
of the condition of their teeth. A proposi-  
tion looking to the betterment of this state  
of affairs was rejected by the board some  
years ago. Mr. Burns thought it ought to  
be reconsidered now. The matter goes to  
the Management Committee for action.

**Overheated Schools.**  
Dr. Noble, under the order of enquiries,  
stated that he had visited a number of the  
schools lately and had found them greatly  
overheated and badly ventilated. The  
thermometers in use were practically use-  
less and ought to be replaced by good ones.  
The Smead Dowd system, in short, was  
by no means perfect. Dr. Noble also drew  
attention to the neglect of the teaching of  
hygiene with physics and affixes, as had been  
recommended by the board.

Mr. D. T. Smith was introduced as a  
representative of the residents of Kew  
Beach to present a petition for the rein-  
statement of Mrs. Charlton as caretaker  
of the Kew Beach school; \$1 names appear-  
ing on it. It was claimed that as Mrs.  
Charlton had been nine years in the em-  
ployment of the board and was a widow  
without other means of support, an injus-  
tice would be done if she were not re-  
appointed. The petition was reserved for con-  
sideration.

Trustee Davis gave notice of a motion to  
enlarge the play ground of the George-street  
school.

**Reports Received.**  
The board then resolved itself into Com-  
mittee of the Whole to discuss reports.

Finance report No. 16, ordering accounts  
to the amount of \$37.74 to be paid and  
the placing of additional insurance on re-  
cently erected buildings, carried without  
comment. Management report No. 17 took  
a long time, however, to pass. There was  
a heated discussion over the proposition to  
substitute Miss Mahaffy for Miss Jolley as  
the new appointee to George-street school,  
but Miss Jolley won the day. Miss Bodley,  
however, will go to Gladstone Avenue school  
instead of Miss Long. One of 8 of the re-  
ports "that the offer to the Toronto Col-  
lege of Music to give six scholarships to be  
completed for by the pupils of the To-  
ronto Public Schools" was accepted" was re-  
jected on the ground that it came out of  
the sphere of study, whereas the present policy  
of the board was for restriction. Clause  
19, "That a meeting of the residents of the  
charge of all schools be accepted," also met  
with disapproval. The remainder carried  
with little discussion. Property report No.  
18, recommending the payment of \$818.88 on  
building account, was adopted, as was also  
supply report No. 10, involving payments of  
over \$5000.

**RACING RECORDS BROKEN**  
At Woodbridge Fair Yesterday - A  
Big Attendance - A Banquet at  
Night - The Last Day.

Woodbridge, Oct. 20 (Special). - Fine  
weather again greeted the Woodbridge Fair  
visitors today. Old Sol was on his best  
behaviour and, although the crowd was  
much smaller than yesterday, the events  
were in many respects better and the ban-  
quet quite as good. Yesterday's gate re-  
ceipt amounted to \$31,150. The receipts  
today would be about \$300.

out of a field of 10. Mr. J. A. Cunningham  
of Highfield took the first prize in the  
heavy draught class. In cattle Mr. J. H.  
Smith of Highfield carried off 17 prizes for  
Jerseys, only one of which was less than  
first.

**The Big Banquet.**  
At the banquet to-night Mr. J. W. St.  
John responded to the toast of "The Do-  
minion and Provincial Legislatures," and com-  
mended fairly like the Woodbridge Fair, for  
being a reflex of the district in an agricul-  
tural, mercantile and social way. He was  
pleased to see so many ladies present and  
favored the extension of the franchise to  
women, feeling assured that their partici-  
pation would have a beneficial effect upon  
character. Alderman Hubbard responded  
to the toast of "Canada and Canadian in-  
stitutions," and in the course of his re-  
marks said: "Canada is not for sale, and if  
sold it will be at the sacrifice of every  
drop of loyal blood in the country. It has  
been taken a war to bring Americans and  
Canadians nearer together, and this is all  
that has been done. The war has not been in vain."  
Others responding to this toast were: W. H.  
Fugler, County Councillor; Rev. Mr. Hen-  
ry, Rev. Mr. Rankin and Rev. C. Miller.  
The banquet closed with the National Anthem  
and the Vaughan Township and Wood-  
bridge Fair for 1898 was at an end.

Stabbed to Death.

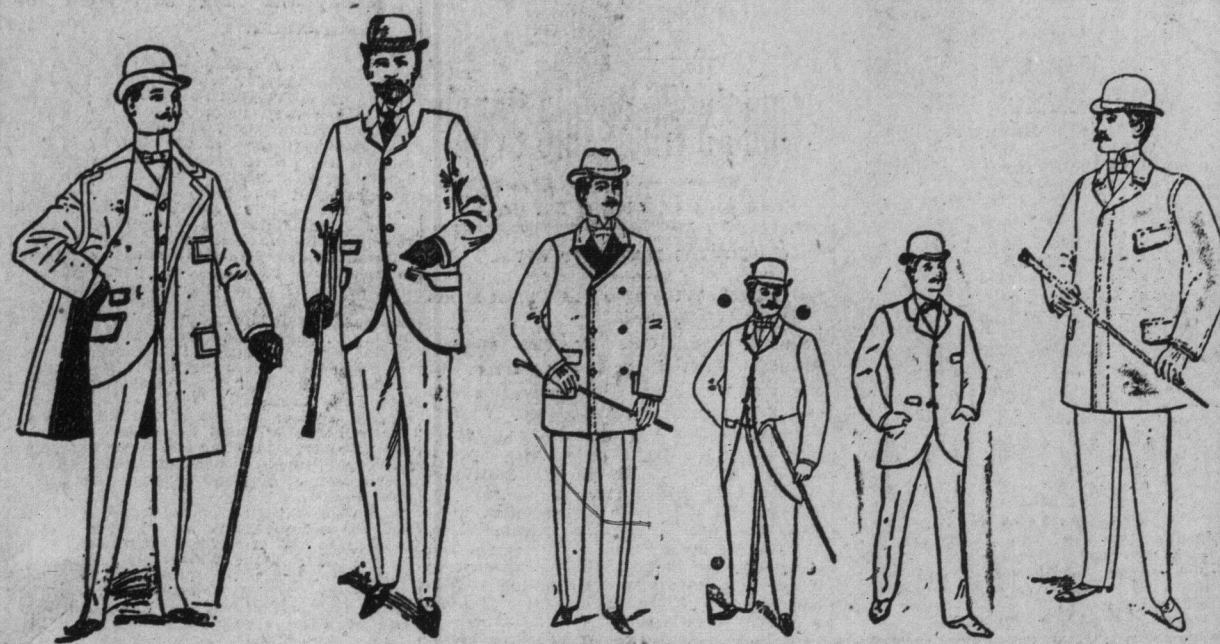
Nantux, Conn., Oct. 20.-Mrs. Ange-

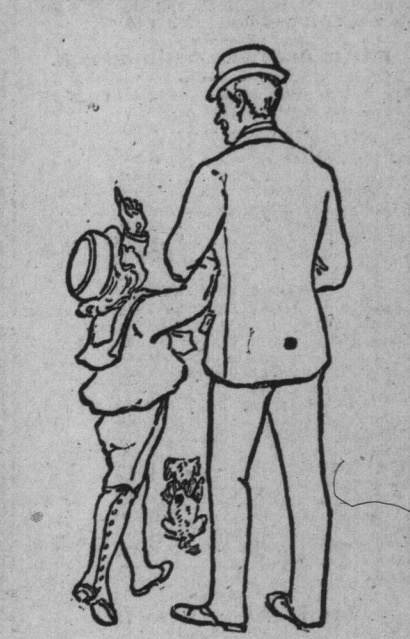
