Dyea and Skaguay to Be Given Up An Agreement Reached to Arbitrate the Disputed Behring Sea

RELATIONS CLOSE AND FRIENDLY

London, Oct. 24.-Russia, it has been learned by the Associated Press, has at last agreed to arbitrate with the United States the claims resulting from the seizure of sealers in the Behring Sea, which have been pending for about eight years. A protocol between the two Governments has been drawn up, the final formalities are expected to be concluded next month, and the arbitration will probably take the form of the

These claims originated in the seizure by These claims originated in the seizure by the Russian authorities off the coast of Siberia of three American sealing vessels, and the damages claimed aggregate about \$150,000. The vessels were the James Hamilton Lewis, the Cape Horn Pigeon and the C. H. White. In each case the largest item of the claim is on account of the sufferings of the American officers and crews while under arrest.

In other words, Canada gives up much of the disputed gold country in return for a seaport, but sipulates that she must get the latter before she agrees to arbitrate the boundary line.




