Happy Homes in Hamilton Would Boys Flocking Back

City Turned Over to Former Residents and Big Success is Assured. Hamilton, Aug. 16.—(Special).—The Old Boys own the city. No one has any doubts about the success of the big show now. The Old Boys are flocking in by the hundreds, those from each town dressed in some special uniform or regalia. Several car loads arrived at the T. H. & B. station from New York this morning, and were triumphantly escorted to their quarters at the Hotel Royal by the Sons of England Band and hundreds of citizens. Mayor Morgan, Samuel Barker, M.P., and many other prominent men were on hand to welcome them.

Another big delegation from Detroit landed at the Stuart-street station this evening. They also got rousing reception. The station is beautifully decorated and the platform was crowded. Cities from all over the continent are sending scores of former residents. Those from Chicago will arrive in the morning.

Citizens are throwing their houses open to the visitors. Out of sixty from the city tonight were taken to private residences. The whole city is in holiday attire. East King-street, on both sides, to Catharine-street, lined with evergreen trees planted in barrels, wrapped in the carnival colors. The Gore Park and Kensington are getting in grandly. All the churches held special services, and the evening preached for the benefit of the Old Boys. The Sons of England Band gave a sacred concert on the Gore. The streets around were blocked by thousands.

Altho the city is so crowded no robberies or losses that pickpockets were reported up till late hour tonight. The police have instructions to pick up all suspicious characters. The carpenters were busy up till about midnight Saturday fixing up the Midway attractions. They wanted to work to-day, but the police would not stand for it. One of the big attractions Monday afternoon will be the lacrosse match, which will commence at 3.30 at the cricket grounds, between Brampton and Port Hope. The Port Hope boys arrived Saturday night. It will be the first time that they have met the Grandfathers on neutral grounds, and they promise to do things up.

Toronto Old Boys Coming. The official excursion of Hamilton boys from Toronto will leave at 3.30 a.m. by boat on Tuesday afternoon, by the 4th Highlanders' Band. The regulation dress for the occasion will consist of white Strathcona hats and navy blue coat, duck pants and black boots. It is difficult, says the memorandum, to estimate the exact number of Bulgarians who were imprisoned, mostly on the firmest pretext, as when they were released others were immediately arrested. The estimates obtainable for the Vilayet of Salonica 600 prisoners; for Uskub, 500; for Monastir, 500, and for Adrianople, 550; a grand total of 2050. As information is lacking from many districts in the vilayets, it is thought that the number of prisoners may be placed at even three times this total. Dealing with other acts of oppression, the memorandum states that the Bulgarian monks and artisans living in Constantinople and Salonica were ordered to return to their native villages and were not allowed to put their property in order or to dispose of the business or property of the business of property. Some of the families of the Bulgarian schools were closed before the end of the school year. The authorities rigorously enforced the order against the Bulgarian priests. Encouraged by the Ottoman authorities, the Greek bishops and archbishops forced their way into the Bulgarian churches, burned the prayer books and employed menaces to compel the people to accept the Greek rite. The archbishop of Salonica declared in a recent sermon that the Sultan did not care for the Bulgarian people, but only for the Turkish empire. If they remained they would be exterminated. In addition to the decree banishing the Bulgarian traders from Constantinople and Salonica, the Porte adopted measures to ruin the traders elsewhere. Every possible effort was made to instill Mussulmanism in Bulgarian villages.
