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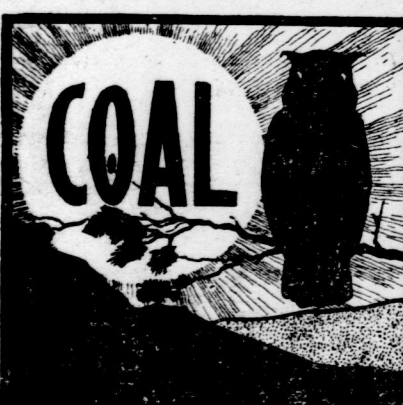
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LONDON AND DISTRICT

MRS. GEORGE'S CASE.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
There appeared a short time ago in your daily paper an account of the deportation of Mrs. George and family from the city to England, and stated that the Government had deported this family. Now, I beg space in your valuable paper to correct matters, as I am in a position to do so, being the Salvation Army agent for Western Ontario.

The Salvation Army Immigration department in Toronto holds this woman's medical certificate, which was satisfactory. She was also passed at the port of landing, and by appearance this woman looked in good health, but shortly after coming to London she was taken ill and sent to the hospital, and there the doctors pronounced her affected with tuberculosis, also that her children were affected. This was reported to Immigration. She was then taken to have her deported, and papers arrived from Ottawa which were filed out and sent in. Meanwhile the Salvation Army officials at Toronto notified me (their agent) to make all arrangements for her going back to England. I accordingly arranged matters. Mr. George and family sailed from Montreal on Oct. 6, and the Salvation Army paid her passage and that of her children.

The report also said she was cared for by the city all the time she was here. Now, we appreciate all the city did for her in the hospital, but what is known she was staying with Mrs. Forster of Elizabeth Street, a considerable time, and also at the Salvation Army Home in the city a few days. I would like to say the Salvation Army is prepared to meet cases of emergency and deport them if necessary, if they have come through our agency. Thanking you for your kindness, Yours,

Sinclair, of St. Thomas, who formerly ministered in the East London church; Amos Towell, Guelph, secretary of the Ontario mission board; D. S. Hamilton, of the First Congregational Church, James Rollins, of the King Street Presbyterian Church, and Elder Wickert, who formerly ministered to the Bible Christians in this same church; and E. R. Wilson, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. Several other ministers sent their regrets at not being able to be present.

—The W. C. T. U. eleventh anniversary, recited "The Bridal Wedding" and Miss Carmichael, of the Conservatory of Elocution, gave an excellent reading. A very pleasant feature of the evening's programme was the reading of letters of congratulation from former pastors: T. L. Fowler, of Medina, Ohio, and George Fowler, of Southport, England.

A number of members from neighboring churches were present—Baptist, Congregational, Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist—and a happy fellowship was enjoyed by the pastor, E. R. Black, and wife, evidently having a rare time for denominational lines. The occasion was a delightful one, and will leave very pleasant memories with those who were present.

WOULD ATTACH \$100,000

Certificate Holders of Defunct Life Company Sue for Big Sum.

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 22.—Legal formalities necessary to attach in the sum of \$100,000 the property of the Hartford Life Insurance Company, having an office here, and the Security Trust Company, both incorporated under the laws of this state, were carried out by the sheriff today in the suit brought against these two companies by certain men representing a so-called safety fund of the company which amounts to more than \$1,000,000. The defendants are ordered to make an accounting and to pay over to the receiver all sums received from certificate holders in connection with the "safety fund."

The suit is returnable in the superior court at Newhaven on Nov. 6.

The company, which ceased business in 1899, was organized to issue a holding plan in 1867, but since the former date has continued to collect premiums on outstanding certificates, as if it were continuing business, it being alleged that in 1899 the outstanding risks amounted to \$90,000,000.

Prior to 1899 the company invented a plan of assessment life insurance which was designated as "The safety fund plan," by which \$3 was collected on each \$1,000 of insurance and put into a fund, the surplus of which was to be distributed among the certificate holders. This "safety fund" was to be deposited with the Security Trust Company.

The plaintiffs in the suit just brought claim that the stockholders having authorized the collection of assessments, the company has ceased to write any more insurance, have thus far failed to make distribution of the safety fund and that the intent is to keep that fund for their own advantage through a final wiping out of certificates due to lapses following increased and exorbitant assessments.

POSTURE CAUSE OF HER EXPOSURE

Girl's Way of Sitting on a Chair Proves That She Is Not of Noble Blood.

Paris, Oct. 22.—In her prison Mme. Bouillet, young and pretty, bitterly regrets that one day recently she seated herself on the edge of a chair. "I would to heaven," cries madame, "that I had planted myself solidly on that execrable chair; filed it even if my attitude left my feet to dangle in mid-air."

For the fact that she deposited her fine figure on the chair as if it was a side saddle discovered that the Bouillet woman is not the Marquise de la Ferroniere, under which high sounding title she has been masquerading; discovered, too, that she is an adroit swindler whose male confederate, Mauruit, escaped justice only by dying at the most opportune moment.

And, more instructive and amusing, the position of the pseudo-marquise on the chair has provoked infinite discussion.

Learned judges during Mme. Bouillet's trial heard her testimony as to how a marchioness should be seated on a chair. Society is discussing the question with so much animation that a noble woman cannot be seated without assuming a self-conscious expression which says plainly:

"Behold, this is the correct pose." The chair fatal to the false Marquise de la Ferroniere, a title as old as Francis I, was in the shop of a dealer in those delicate creations which are named generally limonades. Madame allowed herself to be tempted by the delicious things she saw in the window, entered, apparently fell deeper into temptation and finally ordered her innumerable purchases to be sent to her address, which she gave.

Scarcely had she departed when a shop girl said to the proprietress: "I strongly suspect the rank of that lady. Think, did you ever see a real marchioness sit on the edge of the chair as she did?"

The shopkeeper, who has many aristocratic customers, grew suspicious too. But cautious, she consulted a friend who used to be femme de chambre to an eccentric princess of Holstein, who has since died at Cairo.

"You grievously wrong the marquise," said this authority on noble manners. "Her attitude on a chair proves not only her rank, but that she is accustomed to move in court circles, she sits, in the Russian court, for etiquette is lax at the winter palace, and even at Peterhof. In all other courts, if a sovereign or a royal highness, or even a serene highness, invites a lady to be seated, she places herself on a chair's edge, almost on one hip. This she always does, and her lap, and with her hands folded on her lap, waits to be spoken to, her attitude proving that she recognizes that she is only a part of the room's furniture."

But the so-called Marquise de la Ferroniere did not pay promptly for the limonades and laces she had ordered. The shopkeeper made further inquiries, in which the police assisted. At last they learned that the "marquise" formerly kept a perfume shop, and that about two years ago her admirer, Mauruit, easily persuaded her that it was far easier to live by one's wit than by selling essences and pomades.

Thereafter Mme. Bouillet lived in an atmosphere not of white roses and violet, but of swindling intrigue. Mauruit led a confident but rich tradespeople, know that the "marquise" was about to enter into possession of an estate worth \$50,000,000. To others he appeared as a Corsican count and whispered that he was about to marry the "marquise"; that she would set aside the interest of \$1,000,000 to maintain the splendid establishment they would set up; that she was about to buy a chateau and a stud farm.

The credulous merchants crowded each other to supply the noble lady with jewels, gowns, wines, costly house furnishings. Some even paid Mauruit commissions for bringing her valuable custom to them, and he accumulated \$15,000.

Unluckily for the Bouillet woman he was, more unluckily, she sat on the edge of a chair. Suspecting she was suspected, she fled to Caen, but was arrested.

After being enlightened on the aristocratic and court ladies the judges sentenced her to two years' imprisonment and forbade her to live here for three years after her release. So now she regrets that she seated herself in sight of that observant shopgirl.

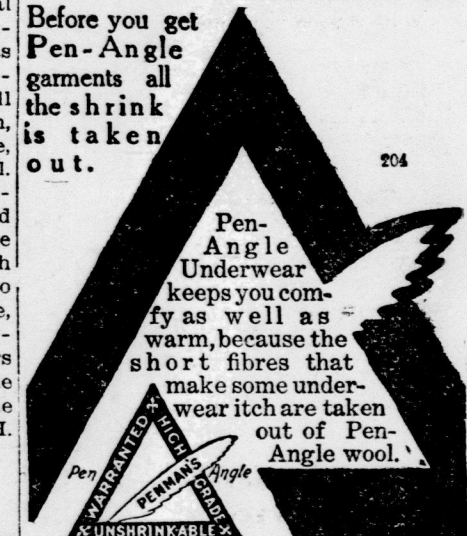
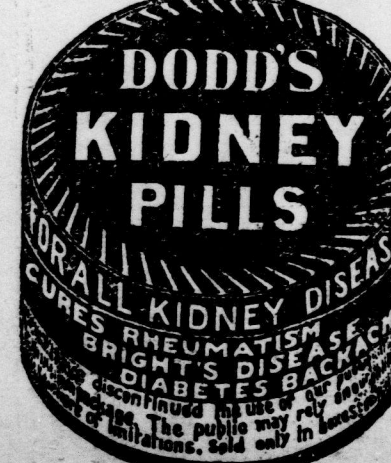
