Toronto, June 28.—There is absolutely no foundation for rumors of impending failures of large Toronto commercial houses. The statement was made today by a

prominent financial man, who is as closely in touch with Toronto's business concerns as anyone in the city. "There have been rumors," ne said, but there is nothing in them. Recent

banking developments have meant the reorganization of certain smaller enterprises, and there have been some compromises; but no further trouble is promised, and all this talk about big houses going to the wall is just rumor, and nothing more. Unfortunately these rumors have spread to outside towns, and some inquiries have reached Toronto."

The reporter mentioned a firm which has been dubbed insecure by some.

"Not a bit of it," was the answer. "That firm is as good as gold, making money fast, in fact. Your mention of it shows how erroneous are some of the reports which have got abroad." The emphatic and authoritative pronouncement on these points should do
