PACIFIC COAST DISASTER OVER ONE HUNDRED DROWN

Lumber Steamer Hits Passenger Boat During Fog, Sending Her to the Bottom.

SINKS IN FIVE MINUTES AFTER BEING STRUCK

San Francisco, July 22.-More than 100 lives were lost last Saturday night, when the steamer Columbia bound north from this port for Portland, collided with the lumber steamer San Pedro off Shelter Cove, Mendocino County. Eighty other persons, who were on the Columbia, were rescued after being in the water several hours. There was a heavy fog at the time, San Pedro, heavily laden with lumber, struck the Columbia on bow, with such terrific force that she was cut down to the water, and sank in about five minutes. Of the 800 passengers many succeeded In reaching the San Pedro, which remained affoat. Only 80 of them rehowever, when after many hours the steamer Ronoke came to their rescue. Captain P. A. Doran, of the Columbia, went down with his The San Pedro was picked up by the steamer George W. Eldor, and is now being towed into Eureka.

Teh only steamer named Columbia, listed in shipping registers, as hailing from a Pacific Coast port, is owned by the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, and hails from Portland, Oregon. She is 310 feet long, registers 1,746 tons, and was built in Chester, Pa., in 1889.

The San Pedro hails from San Francisco, and is 163 feet long, registers 559 tons, and was built in 1899 at Aberdeen, Washington.

A Middlesex Boy.

Edward Blake is regarded by most of the older school of Londoners as belonging to this city. He was born at Cairngorm, near Strathroy, Ont., on Oct. 13, 1833, and is the eldest son of Oct. 13, 1833, and is the eldest son of the late Hon. William Hume Blake, day, and Gen. He began his political career in 1867, In that year he being elected to both the House of Commons of Canada and the Ontario Legislature. On the defeat of the Sandfield Macdonald Government in 1871 Mr. Blake was called upon to form a new administration for Ontario, and succeeded in the task.

Upon the abolishment of dual representation some time later Mr. Blake resigned the premiership of Ontario, and devoted his whole attention to federal politics. He was succeeded afterwards by Sir Oliver Mowat.

In Dominion Politics.

When Hon. Alexander Mackenzie became premier, Mr. Blake accepted a place in his cabinet, but without portfolio, and in 1874 he resigned owing

In May, 1875, he accepted the office of minister of justice of Canada. After the defeat of the Mackenzie Government he was chosen leader of the Liberal party in 1878. He held this position until 1887, when he was succeeded by Hon. (afterward Sir) Wilfrid as a precaution.

Went to Ireland.

In June, 1892, Mr. Blake accepted an invitation extended to him to take a seat in the British House of Commons under the Irish leader. In the same year he contested South Longford, and defeated his Conservative opponent, Mr. J. H. Miller, the vote standing 2,554

for Blake and 347 for Miller. An ardent Home Ruler, Mr. Blake enhanced in imperial politics the reputation he made for himself in Canada, and he was elected a member of the executive committee of the Irish parliamentary party. He is also one of the ablest lawyers Canada has as yet turned out, and he frequently appeared in important cases before the Privy Council in which Canadians were



Pittsburg, July 22. - John J. Wallace, a well-known businessman of this city, is dead with a broken neck, his wife dying at her home with internal injuries, and J. S.
