

"FUSS" STARTED OVER PASS WORDS

Colored Men Have Scrap Over
Society Matters and One
Is Fined.

Some time ago John Anderson (colored) laid a charge against William and Isaac Groat (also colored) for assaulting him, and striking him with some sharp instrument, which caused a severe scalp wound. William Groat was arrested, tried and discharged, but Isaac had fled the town and could not be found until a day or so ago, when he came back and was arrested. He appeared behind the bars at the police court this morning, and pleaded not guilty to the charge of assaulting Anderson with a weapon.

Anderson was called, and he told of how he had gone to Mr. Hurst's house on the night of the alleged assault. The prisoner Isaac Groat, William Groat and another man, whom he did not know, were there. Anderson and Isaac Groat were both Knights of Pythias, and when the prisoner tried to give him (Anderson) some "pass words" and "grit" the "fuss" commenced. Groat struck Anderson and knocked him off a box, on which he was sitting. Anderson asked the prisoner, why he struck him, but the "fuss" continued and both William Groat and the prisoner attacked Anderson, who sustained the wound on the head. Anderson did not know exactly what he was hit with, but it was some blunt instrument, he said. He did not know whose hands the weapon was in. George Hurst, in whose house the row took place, told of the commencement of the trouble and how he had warned them against "fussing" in his house, and finally turned them out. After a while Anderson came back with a wound on his head and said that someone had struck him with something more than a fist, and that he was going to the hospital. Hurst saw William Groat take Isaac, the prisoner, away, and that was all he knew about the affair.

Groat took the stand and gave evidence in his own behalf. He told of the row, and admitted assaulting Anderson by striking him with his fist, but denied using an instrument. He admitted drinking that day. His reason for the assault was that Anderson had insulted his brother William. When asked why he left town after the assault, and where he had gone, he said that he had secured a position on the steamer Huronic, and while working there had heard of the affair, and came back like a man to stand his trial.

None of the witnesses denied that there had been considerable drinking, and as there was no proof that Isaac Groat had struck Anderson with anything other than his fist, he was convicted of common assault, and fined \$5 and \$4 50 costs or one month in jail.

WANT \$10 A DAY

Cabbies Present Bills for Services at
Grey Reception.

THE SAUNBY CASE IS ADJOURNED

Plaintiff's Counsel Insists Upon
Having Certain Waterworks
Records.

The assessing of damages in the case of Saunby vs. the City of London came to an abrupt ending this morning before the arrival of Judge Finkle, who has been appointed to fix the damages. When Mr. Fisher, of Meredith & Fisher, for the city, and Mr. Ivey, of Ivey & Dromgole, for the plaintiff, met at the court house, they had a conference and the result was that the argument before the judge was adjourned sine die.

Mr. Ivey informed Mr. Fisher that unless certain records of the waterworks department he had asked for were produced, he would refuse to go on with the case.

As the documents have not as yet been found by the waterworks staff, there was nothing to be done but adjourn, and this was done. Judge Finkle was then notified and he did not come to London.

It is said that the records asked for were left in court by the waterworks department some time ago and that they cannot now be found. That the plaintiff deems them of the utmost importance is evident from the action of Mr. Ivey, who refuses to proceed until they shall have been found.

It was said today by a gentleman in close touch with the case that the city is willing to rest its side of the question on the statement of damages made by an engineer, Mr. Wisner, for the plaintiff some years ago. At that time the engineer quoted is alleged to have stated in a written report that when the water was 3.55 feet over the top of the dam, it would injure Mr. Saunby's business, or rather his water privileges, to the extent of about \$450 a year.

And it is further alleged that the records of the waterworks department will show that the water has been at this point but very few days during the past seven years.

Thus it would appear from these alleged facts, that the city would be very anxious to base the damages on the statements of Mr. Saunby's engineer.

It is not known when the case will be proceeded with. It may be that the parties to the suit will now get together and settle the matter of damages without resort to a judge.

AYLMER WILL NOT COME THIS YEAR

The Brigadier-General Is Not to
Inspect Militia Camp—
Orders Issued.

The beat of the drum, the tread of many soldiers, and the sound of the bugle, have awakened old Carling's Heights into life once more. Last Saturday preparations for the militia camp on the heights commenced in earnest, when the army service corps, arrived, and yesterday the advance parties of the different regiments arrived and got tents, blankets and all the other necessary paraphernalia ready. Today the soldiers come and it is expected that by tomorrow at noon the camp will be in full swing.

The coming of Brigadier-General Lord Aylmer, Inspector-General, has been looked forward to with interest as the event of the camp, but this year the chief of the general staff, Major General Lake, will inspect the camp from 13th to 16th of June.

Lieut.-Colonel Nattress, principal medical officer for Western Ontario, command, will be here and inspect the first camp on the 15th of June and the second camp on the 28th of June.

TO FINANCE G. T. P. BRANCH LINES

Bill for Incorporation of Com-
pany Before the Railway
Committee.

Ottawa, Ont., June 5.—The Grand Trunk Pacific branch line company bill was up at the railway committee today. It was called for several times this session, but was always held over. Today Mr. Biggar, solicitor of the G. T. P., said that the company was required to finance the branch line bonds, which could be floated easier under the guarantee of the G. T. P. than otherwise.

Mr. Carvell (Carleton) said that he wanted to see the Minister of Railways present before the bill was proceeded with. He was opposed to the dropping of the Maritime Provinces branch line which was done at the suggestion of Mr. Emmerson, because the minister was opposed to competition to the Intercolonial. If the I. C. R. would not put its grade in shape to haul freight from Moncton to Halifax, then the G. T. P. should have an opportunity to do so. He was in favor of a branch line from Champlain to St. John.

It was agreed to hold this part of the bill over until Mr. Emmerson returned. Several members of Parliament complained that the branches were not properly defined. Mr. Aylesworth said that he went over the bill with the Minister of Railways and prepared amendments specifying more fully where the lines should run. These amendments are to be presented. It was agreed to give a line from Edmundston, N. B., to Fraserville, Que.

BIG MEN ARE SCARCE

Difficulty Found in Obtaining Them for
Police Force.

Big men are very scarce now. At least Chief of Police Williams finds it very difficult to secure recruits for the police force. He could get plenty of little men, he thinks, but big men are few and far between.

CUTS OUT ADDRESSES

Large Attendance at Mr. Fitzpatrick
Mounts Supreme Bench.

Ottawa, June 5.—There was a large attendance at the supreme court today, when the Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick took his seat upon the bench as chief justice. Among those in attendance were the Secretary of State, Minister of Customs and the Speaker of the House of Commons. At Mr. Fitzpatrick's special request, there were no congratulatory addresses.

The Society of St. James' Presbyterian

The Home Missionary Society of the New St. James' Presbyterian Church is trying a new plan in its meetings. Last evening an open meeting of the society was held in the schoolroom, the men of the congregation taking full control. The pastor, Mr. Mitchell, presided.

Mr. Ed Wyatt, of St. George's school, gave the reading of the evening from the Book of Deuteronomy. He spoke of the urgent necessity of work in the home mission field.

Mr. J. P. Anderson gave an interesting and instructive reading on the topic, of the evening, "Galicians, Former Home and Characteristics." He spoke of the crude methods of living of the 6,000,000 inhabitants of Galicia, and of the almost aboriginal custom of keeping pigs and hens in their dwellings.

Mr. Goetz Quantz also spoke on "Galicians and Their Present Conditions in Canadian Northwest." Their life is very simple, he said. Many of their houses consist of a room for the cattle and one for the family, the only entrance being through the former room. Mr. Quantz ventured to say that in a couple of generations the Galician emigrants would be as good as British citizens as the Canadians themselves.

RUSSIAN SOCIALISM

Total Abolition of Private Property Held
to Solve Problems.

St. Petersburg, June 5.—The extent to which socialistic theories have taken possession of the proletariat is evidenced by the agrarian programme adopted by the radical peasant-workmen group in the lower house, which aims ultimately, not only at the complete nationalization of land with its attendant total abolition of private property, but the socialization of industry. The programme provides for the creation of a national land fund from the crown, church and private property exceeding a certain amount in value, the state to pay for expropriated property, and in the cities, the factories and mills to be gradually transferred to the state for the benefit of the workmen. After taking such land as needed for state and public needs, the remainder would be distributable to any body desiring to till it, preference being given to the local agriculturists. The workers of the soil would gain an occupation tax, varying

A good deal of the trading in Reading is thought to represent manipulation on the part of a house which has been very active in the market. The market for
