ATTACKS THE FOOD BOARD

Declares Foodstuff Orders Are Designed To Help the Middleman.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 1.-The food profiteer and their ill-gotten gains were manandled in vigorous style by Archie DR. BROWN, EYE, EAR, NOSE AND McCoig this afternoon in his speech on the budget. The fighting member from Kent was in his best form, and delivered what competent critics call the est speech so far on this subject. 
