FRED LOGAN SAYS ROBSON IS EASY

Blue Nose Says That He Has Beaten Robson All Around the Circuit.

Toronto, Jan. 23.—Fred Logan, the St. John skater, who will meet Fred J. Robson, of Toronto in Montreal, has things to say about Robson's claim to the Canadian championship title.

"I'd like to know where he has a right to the Canadian title," says Logan. "I beat him three out of four at St. John, and at Pittsburgh, and I think I will be able to show the people here that I have a little more claim on it than he has. Robson is easy."

Talking about Morris Wood, he said: "The first time I met him was at Saranac Lake three years ago, and I got second in the three miles.

"The next time I met him was here in Montreal. Here I got one second and two thirds. I skated the mile heat in 2:56.

"The next time I met him was at Saranac Lake last year, and then I won three out of four events.

"Wood got the three-mile race. "Here I also won three out of four events and would have won the mile only I fell down in my heat."

"I skated a dead heat here with Lamy in the half-mile, and when we skated off I beat him dead easy."

"Next time I met Wood was at St. John, N. B., down home. There were three of us—Wood, Duffy and myself. The rink is a round rink, with 14 laps to the mile. He won the 20, I won the 40.

"I skated in 49:15. In the half-mile Duffy fell and took me down with him. That was the last time I met Wood. I tell you I am sorry I cannot meet him again this winter."

WANTS TO RUN SPEEDY LONGBOAT

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 23.—Charles Perry, who has been in the R.C.R. here the past nine months, has taken his discharge and left last night for Barrie, Ont. He claims that previous to coming here he did considerable distance running from two to twelve miles, and is anxious for a try at longboat. He claims to run two and a half miles in twelve minutes flat, and a eleven and a half miles cross-country in an hour and two minutes. He was injured just after coming to Halifax, and was unable to get a try at the local runners.

UNIQUE PIN FOR JOHN W. CHOWEN

He was leaving the old city for Western fields, but would always have a deep interest in Stratford, and would keep close tab on all the doings relating to the city, especially in hockey lines. But, Owing to a "Technicality," the Marks Were Not Allowed.

New York, Jan. 23.—The New York A. C. champion swimmer, Charles M. Daniels, last night broke two more records, but on account of technicalities they will not be allowed. It was at the opening meet of the New York Swimming Association in the new public pool bath at Avenue A and Twenty-third street, that Daniels made his records, but his best of the 50-yard swim he covered the distance, making two turns, in 24.3 seconds, beating the old record of 25.1 seconds. In the 200-yard swim Daniels was credited with 2:09.25. Neither new mark will be allowed, because the timing officials were not at the finish with their watches, but caught the time at the opposite end of the pool.

DAN KELLY TO RUN IN NEW YORK

New York, Jan. 23.—Daniel J. Kelly, who electrified the world by running 100 yards in 9.3 seconds at Spokane, Wash., on June 3, 1906, the fastest time the distance has ever been covered, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, will be in Madison Square Garden on next Monday evening and will surely start. Among the best judges of running in this country the Portland man is accounted to be the fastest sprinter the world has ever produced, and in their calculations as to whether 100 yards can be covered in 9 seconds the almost unanimous opinion seems to be that it is not impossible and Kelly is the only man in sight to accomplish it.

J. W. Morton Married.
J. W. Morton, the amateur sprint champion, was married at Cardiff yesterday to Miss Rene Howard, of Bristol.

English Hockey Team's Tour.
The English team will leave for Switzerland to defend the Grindelwald international ice hockey cup on Friday next. After this match a tour has been arranged through Switzerland, where the team will play against various clubs. Afterwards matches are to be decided with the Sporting Club at Lyons, and against the French team at Paris, where the tour will conclude.

Death of An Old Blue.
The funeral took place at Minchin-hampton, near Stroud, yesterday, of Mr. Henry Denne, who rowed in the late Lord Justice Chilly's famous Oxford eight in 1852, and also in the following year, subsequently coaching the Oxford crew for one season. He was an enthusiastic cricketer, a keen rider to hounds, and fond of all sports. Deceased, who was born in 1830, belonged to an old Kentish family. His eldest son, Major Denne, Gordon Highlanders, was killed at Elandslaagte early in the Boer war.

The Invincible Hanlan.
London Daily Mail: Loving rowing whose memories go back 20 to 30 years will be grieved to hear of Ned Hanlan's death. The great Canadian sculler outlived his fame, fading into obscurity while still a young man, but so long as he remained unbeaten he had a glorious career. Professional sculling is so dead in this country now that young people will perhaps hardly believe that during his early visits to England Hanlan was a popular idol.

There was a short-lived boom in the sport, and Hanlan's name was on everyone's lips. He caused a sensation when he easily beat Elliott on the Tyne in 1875, but his greatest race in England was his first one in 1880, with Trickett, the Australian, who had won the championship of the world from Joe Sadler in 1876. Never probably did any sculling match excite such widespread interest or lead to so much betting. It was a fierce struggle up to a certain point, but Trickett cracked at the end.

Col. Williams Will Be Here.
Col. Hanbury-Williams, the Olympic commissioner, will be in Toronto Friday, and will meet Dr. D. Bruce Macdonald, of the Olympic committee. They will informally discuss Olympic matters before leaving for Toronto Bay.

"What has been done?" Dr. Macdonald was asked.

He replied that while there had been no meetings of the Olympic commission, a great deal of preliminary work has been done, and things were shaping up to the point where a meeting was necessary.

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
