

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK;
FIVE OF CREW KILLED

NEW YORK, April 3.—The British steamer Stanley, from Newport, with a cargo of grain for Cherbourg, was sunk by a German submarine without warning March 31.

Five members of the crew were killed. Fifteen survivors of the ship's crew reached Port Albany.

FELT IN AUSTRALIA

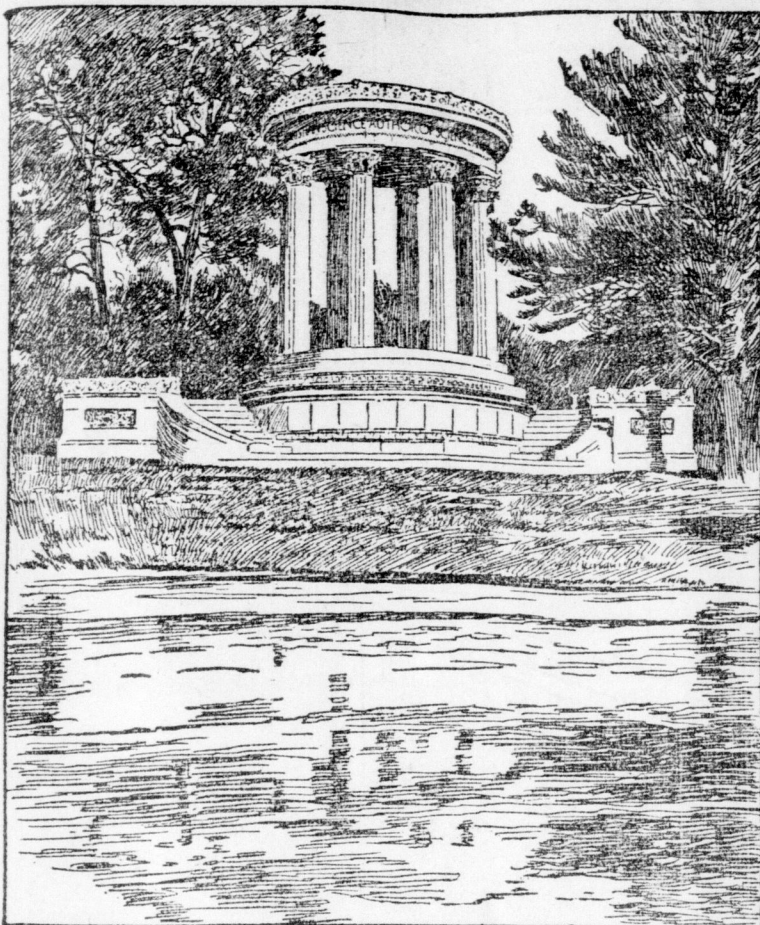

THE MARY BAKER EDDY MEMORIAL
(At Mount Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, Mass.)

The memorial to Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science, erected in Mt. Auburn Cemetery at Cambridge, Mass., was recently turned over to the Christian Science board of directors by Elbert S. Barlow of New York, who had charge of its construction. Over a year and a half has been required to complete it. Christian Scientists throughout the world have contributed, as expressions of sentiment, the entire cost of over \$150,000.

The memorial is of Bethel white granite, and consists of an open circular colonnade of eight columns fifteen feet in height surmounted by a cornice and cresting. The space inside the colonnade is to be filled with growing flowers. The columns rest on a stylobate of three steps, which also rest, at one side, on a broad platform

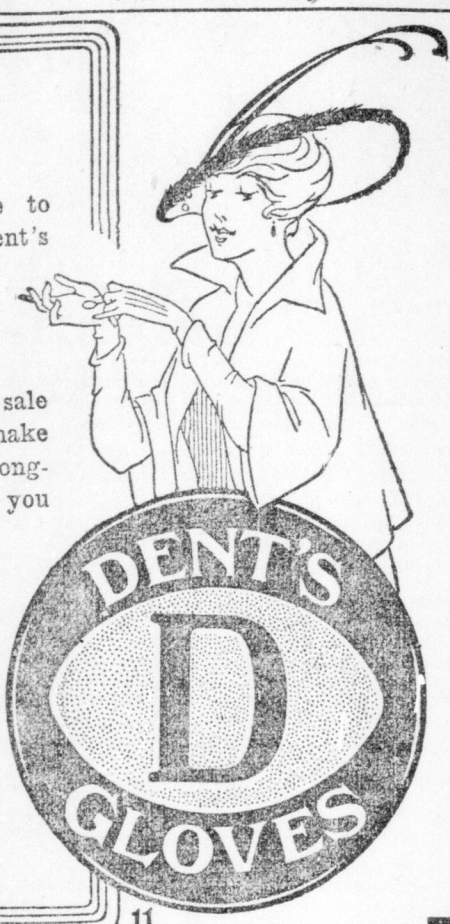
of Pompton pink granite and, at the other, which is about five feet lower, on a double flight of circular steps. These are flanked on each side by a large pylon. The pylons were exhibited a short time ago at the American Institute of Architecture in New York, and were pronounced by several experts to be the finest pieces of carved granite ever executed. The detail is elaborated to an extent never before attempted in granite; some of the stems and leaves are practically free-standing, so great is the relief.

Mr. Swartwout, the architect, designed the new Missouri State capitol, and recently won the competition for the new George Washington memorial. All that now remains to be done to complete the memorial to Mrs. Eddy is the planting for the landscape, which is to consist chiefly of some evergreen plants that will preserve their form and leaves throughout the year, and some cedars and rhododendrons.

ARE YOU going to sacrifice foot comfort for the sake of conforming to the latest vogue? It really is not necessary, for shoes are now made on lasts to fit any requirements. One pair of shoes certainly cannot meet every use. It is cheapest in the end to have a pair for every distinct occasion. So choose your footwear according to the service for which they are intended. The shoe comfortable does not give undue pressure on any part of the foot, but holds the foot in a firm manner.

One need not try to imitate Cinderella, because a shoe that is too small does not give a good appearance to the foot. The price of shoes is rapidly increasing, therefore, we should learn how to take care of our shoes. When purchasing your footwear inquire what is the best polish, etc., to use.

Slender and graceful are the shoes of shapely lasts, and refined style is incorporated in the smarter lines. This season's styles reflect a use of colored leather in combinations. The use of cloth tops is evident. Shoe tops following in the wakes of longer skirts have shortened their aspirations.

The newest of new topplings are light champagne, pearl, medium grey, chamise, castor, and white, about seven and one-half and eight inches high. With cloth topplings buttons have the first call.

used, but somehow, it often finds itself in combination with other colors. Light effects and light soles are seen in the correct footwear. Heels are Louis, Half Louis, and Cuban, according to the use. They are a little higher for dress or lower for sport wear. Many are distinguished by aluminum plates. Vamps are longer than ever. The shoe of two seasons ago looks short compared with the ones offered at present.

An oddity indeed is an all-cloth boot of corn stalk with a vamp, stay and top edging of patent leather in new pointed pattern. A black patent kid has pearl grey trimmings with black heel fitted with aluminum plate.

A black and white brocade all-cloth boot has a black enamel Louis wooden heel. Russet and all shades of brown in different combinations point to the preference for those shades.

Bracelet shoes worn by ultra smart fashionable come in a multitude of shapes, demure or daring with lines of graceful elegance. One of black satin is encircled with grey and buttoned with four buttons, and then again another one for the straps.

For evening wear anklet bracelets embellished with colored crystal, gold beads, or rhinestones, are ordained to be the rage.

White kid and black patent leather with the patent leather perforated so the white material glimpses through illustrates the general style trend.

The low shoe has come into its own again, for with the advent of

warm weather, women think in terms of the low shoe. The short tongue pump with patent vamp, full Louis heel, in various combinations, materials and colors, has been listed for those who desire fashion combined with comfort. An accepted style is indicated by a Colonial pump with kid vamp and foxing, with imitation stitching to produce a plug cut vamp effect.

Black patent leather pumps with white calf or kid score a triumph. White calf, kid or fabric, two-button strapped pumps with full Louis heels are distinctly smart. Russian calf pumps are worn considerably.

Sport styles give every indication of popularity, and as there are over two million golf players in America, their wants, too, have to be considered. For all footwear, especially sports, this will probably be a great white season. Sports pumps made with combinations of greyish black and white striped cloth reflect popularity of striped cloth. White kid pumps with pointed trimmings of black leather and black lacings indicate the black and white vogue which knows no waning.

Satin or suede pumps beaded with iridescent beads vie in popularity with those having beaded birds ornamenting the vamp. These birds fly from I know not where. Others have beaded decorations from basket motifs in rich coloring, but more conservative are the black satin models with steel beaded ornaments.

For tripping the light fantastic too a blue and silver brocade pump has a blue bow of the same material. Colored kid pumps with gilt or silver trimmings are worn to match the gown. Fancy slippers embroidered in colored silks, are worn either matching the costume or in a contrasting color.

Hosiery. Silk stockings are no longer considered a luxury. So ordinary are they that percheron cotton and lisle will be voted aristocratic in days yet to come. Drawn work, open lace work in cobweb like stripes, plaids and checks in any shade desired are ready to be bootied.

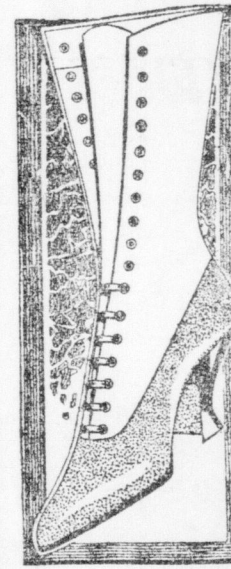

The U. S. Government has ordered the entire stock of raw wool in the Boston market placed under a Government option.

Swiss citizens have been sent out of St. Quentin by the Germans.

Heavy artillery engagements have taken place in the Adige Valley between the Austrians and the Italians.

President Wilson's name was greeted with a storm of applause in the British Commons.

WHITLOCK AT BERNE.
Berne, April 3.—Via Paris, April 4.—Grand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium, reached Berne at 6 o'clock this evening, looking worn and weary. He admitted feeling extremely nervous and fatigued after the tremendous strain under which he has been working, which has been especially hard during the last few weeks. The party left Brussels on Monday night on a special train.

In addition to sixty Americans, com-

prising the legation's staff, consular agents and all but five of the Belgian relief commission officials, Mr. Whitlock traveled with the Chinese chargé d'affaires from Brussels with his staff and their families. The Chinese officials had received instructions to leave Brussels for Havre at almost the same time as the Americans.

LONDON, April 2.—An official statement issued tonight characterizes as "the usual pure invention," the German claim made officially at Berlin that an 8,000-ton British auxiliary cruiser was sunk in March.

Born in 1840, he was a member of the House of Commons for Leeds for more than twenty years up to the time when he was created a baron in 1902; was formerly financial secretary of the treasury and was chief secretary for Ireland in 1901-02.
