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WHEELMAN ENTERING LOCAL RACES DOES SENSATIONAL WORK

Lowrey of Toronto Wheels 92 Miles in Record Time.

Toronto, June 27.—James Lowrey, star racing man of the Classic Bicycle Club, Toronto, finished off his training for the 25-mile road race in London on Dominion Day by a performance that has created a sensation in cycling circles. Lowrey covered 22 miles in 4-1-5 hours, making the trip from Toronto to Hamilton and back in all kinds of road racing time.

Lowrey started from the headquarters of the Classic Club, in the east end of the city, rode through Toronto and thence on to Hamilton. Returning he rode from the city hall in Hamilton to the city hall in Toronto. The first half of his sensational ride was done in one hour and fifty minutes, while the return journey against a wind, took him two hours

speed was twenty-two miles per hour for the 22 miles.

In riding from Toronto to Hamilton, Lowrey exceeded the official record for the inter-city course by no less than twenty-two minutes, the official mark being two hours and twelve minutes, which was established in 1908 by Walter Andrews, former champion bicycle racer of Canada. Following his participation in the 25-mile grind in London on the holiday, Lowrey will make an official attempt to establish a new record for the Toronto-Hamilton course. Lowrey is an all-round athlete, as he is the Ontario middleweight champion, and was the Ontario champion of Toronto stars in London's long-distance feature.
