ADVANCE ON PETROGRAD MADE BY ANTI-BOLSHEVIK ARMY

Commander of Rumanian Forces Gives Word to Inter-Allied Commission-Chief Allied Food Administrator Refuses To Send Any More Supplies To Hungary Unless Assured They Will Not Be Seized by Rumania's Soldiers.

Budapest, Aug. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—As a result of the first day's conference between the inter-allied commission, Constantine Diamendi and Gen. Marghason, commander of the Rumanian troops here, a promise was made by the Rumanians that they would cease requisitioning food in Budapest and certain other localities. What guarantees were given for the carrying out of his promise is not known at present, nor is it clear when the Rumanians will leave the city.

Capt. Thomas C. Gregory, chief allied food administrator in Central Europe, appeared before the conference and said he would not assist in sending food to Hungary if the Rumanians were go ing to requisition it.

Some of the strikes threatened are by inter-borough carmen and shopmen, workers in the entire building trades, workers in the entire clothing industry, postal clerks and letter-carriers, teamsters and mattress workers.

### SUPREME COUNCIL SENDS ANSWER TO RUMANIAN NOTE

Paris, Aug. 14.—The supreme council in its response, drafted today, to the reply of the Rumanian Government to the note of the council regarding the occupation of Budapest, does not ask the Rumanians to leave Budapest immediately. The council advises Rumania that the inter-allied military commission at Budapest will discuss mooted points with Rumanian officials there.

The reply of the council, which probably will be sent to Bucharest tomorrow, is looked upon as having been designed to facilitate negotiations without causing a breach.

Western Farmers Demand an Amount Equal to Minimum Price in U.S.

Winnipeg, Aug. 15 .- Declaring that i imperative in the interests alike o the consuming public and the producer to make the amount of the advance or the Canadian wheat crop of 1919 at least equal to the minimum price now being paid in the United States, the executive of the council of agriculture has sent a statement to the Canadian wheat board elaborating the resolution forwarded by the council to the Dominion | Government on August 1. The farmers of the West, it is pointed out, in claiming such an advance are doing so unde the shadow of threatening financial calamity. They must, it is asserted, receive it if they are even to meet the heavy expense involved in the cost of production during the current season. The point is emphasized that the Government would be running no risk of loss, while actual conditions bearing upon the supply of wheat, it is said, justify no other methods.

### DRUNKEN SAILORS ALLOWED STEAMER TO DRIFT AFTER PUTTING OFFICERS IN IRONS

American Vessel Carrying Several Thousand Cases of Whiskey Is Picked Up in Atlantic-Negro Stokers Caused Trouble.

London, Aug. 15.—A wireless dispatch received at Queenstown from the British tank steamer War Khan says that the tanker had picked up another steamer in mid-ocean, finding the crew drunk, the captain incapacitated from injuries and some of the other officers in irons. The crew of the War Khan arrested the mutinous crew of the other steamer and supplied enough men to take the steamer to Brest, where it was bound. The name of the steamer on which the crew mutinied could not be deciphered from the wireless dispatch

St. John, N.B., Aug. 15.-A roya welcome was extended to his royal highness, the Prince of Wales, as he set foot for the first time on Canadian soil at 11 o'clock this morning. The weather was not auspicious, rain commencing to fall shortly before the prince left his ship, but the adverse conditions in no way affected the warmth of his reception, nor lessened the enthusiasm of the greetings extended to the heir of the British throne. It was eminently fitting that the prince's first glimpse of Canada should be the city founded by the loyalists who had sacrificed so much to remain beneath the British flag, and the heartiness of the welcome showed that the same spirit still animates those who have come after them. From all parts of New Brunswick and from farther distances great numbers had flocked to join with the citizens in their welcome to the prince, and dense crowds thronged the streets and occupied every point of vantage along the route taken by the prince and at various places where he stopped for the ceremonies arranged in his honor.

# SINN FEIN DEMONSTRATION

First Time Such Drastic Action Has Been Taken in Historic City Since the Siege of 1689-Orangemen and Unionists Determined Not To Permit Parade, Which They Term Anti-British.

Londonderry, Ireland, Aug. 15 .- Troops manned the walls of Londonderry today for the first time since the historic siege of the city in 1689, as part of the military effort to prevent the Nationalist and Sinn Fein "lady day" demonstration set for today. The demonstration had been forbidden by the British commander, General Hacket-Pain.

Orangemen and Unionists, it is said, have declared their determination not to permit the holding of the parade, which they termed anti-British.

IRISH MEMBERS LEAVE FOR HOME.

London, Aug. 15.—A number of members of the House of Commons representing Irish districts left for Ireland last night after it was announced that the Government had decided to suppress all Sinn Fein and kindred organizations in County Clare as the result of increased disorders there.
