

PRESBYTERY NAMES MEN FOR BOARD OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Rearrangement of Charges
Settled After Heated Dis-
cussion Last Night.

REV. F. R. HIRST RESIGNS

Minister To Fill Vacancy Will
Be Appointed Soon As
Possible.

At the afternoon session of the London Presbytery held in the First Presbyterian Church on Tuesday the following nominations were made to the board of the general assembly: Rev. Robert Johnson, formerly of St. Andrew's Church, this city, now of Montreal, as professor of practical theology at Knox College; Rev. W. J. Knox, professor of religious education at Knox College; Rev. J. Hollins, B.A., of Peterborough, formerly of King Street Church, as editor of Presbyterian publications.

Rev. R. M. Davidson of Galt was nominated as editor of the "Presbyterian" in Toronto, and Dr. John Nicol of Saskatoon for the chair of instruction to non-English speaking students. The home mission committee was asked particularly to look into the matter of work in West London, Chelsea Green and Knollwood Park, and also to confer with Chalmers Church in an effort to assist them. A minister to fill the vacancy of Rev. F. R. Hirst will be secured as soon as possible. Rev. D. C. MacGregor gave a detailed report of the forward movement committee.

Rearrangement Settled.
The rearrangement of charges in the presbytery after much heated discussion was finally settled. Cookes Church, Delaware and South Caradoc will be under one charge; Komoka, Mount Brydges and North Caradoc second, and Hyde Park and West London will form a third charge. It was only after representatives from the affected churches had been heard at some length that this decision was finally made.

Tuesdays are to be book nights. On these nights the girls will give suggestions as to the best books to read, and how to tell stories. Travel talks will also be given. Miss McLoughlin and Miss Hazel Tanner of the London public library and Miss Marjorie Ross of the Western University library will assist in this part of the work.

Monday night will be leaders' nights. On the first and third Monday Mrs. John Crawford will take Bible study groups, and on the second and fourth Mondays T. D. McCullough of the social service department will take up industrial problems. The girls are also to be urged to attend their various church societies on these nights, and to be present at the church on every Monday night to take strangers in the city to their particular church and introduce them to the club.

On Sundays the home hours will be held at the "Y." again as last year in co-operation with the Young People's Societies of the various churches, and Saturday afternoons will be given over to walking parties and nature hikes.

Outside Classes.
All this work will be carried on at the Central Y. W. C. A. building, but in addition to this there will be excellent classes held outside of the Y. W. C. A., specially arranged for "Y." girls.

Subjects as "Women as Wage Earners," "Occupations Open to Women," etc., to be held in co-operation with the students of Western University under the supervision of Miss Margaret Gemmell.

Registration for all these classes will be carried on from September 29 to October 1, and the regular classes and club work will begin on October 4.

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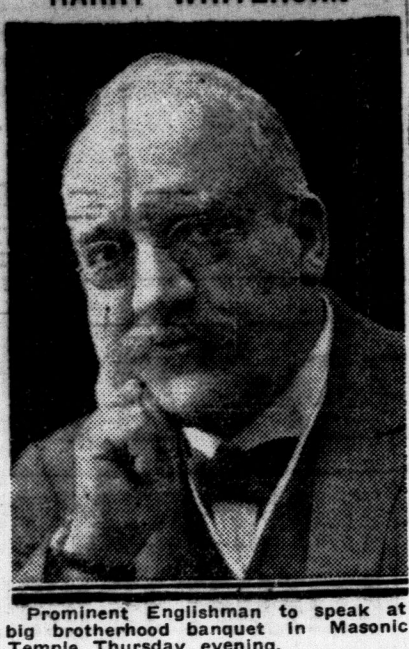

WINTER PROGRAMS ARE ARRANGED BY Y. M. C. A. OFFICERS

Drive For New Members and
To Secure Old Ones
Planned.

TO INTEREST R. C. R.

Boxing, Wrestling Tests Arranged—Skiing Also On Boys' Schedule.

The annual meeting of the chairman of the department of the Y. M. C. A. to discuss the plans they have drawn up for the winter was held last evening in the local "Y." About fifty attended, including a few members, their friends and the chairman of the various committees.

A dinner was served before the speaking commenced. Each chairman reported plans he had arranged for his department this winter, and from the opinion of all who attended, a most successful year will be experienced.

W. T. Clark, chairman of the membership committee, informed those present that his committee is going to launch a campaign at once for new members, and at the same time to get the old members to sign up for another year. A list will be secured of all the old members, and the committee will forward them their ticket for membership for this year, and they will be asked to join again. All members of the "Y." are expected to get behind this and make it a success, as it is considered as the biggest drive yet known.

Decided Success.
W. D. Deemer, chairman of the boys' work department, reported that this past year was a decided success in his department, and that it had grown to be the most important department of the Y. M. C. A. They have divided their program into five parts, namely: physical, education, social, extension, and physical. Bible studies will be held, and at the end of the year there will be examinations. They will endeavor to establish loyalty to the church and the Sunday school.

Regarding the educational program, he stated that a book will be received for the library, and will be concerning the guidance of boys to become citizens that any city will be proud to have. Educational guidance will take a firmer hold, and the boys will be asked to choose what work they want to do in life.

A wireless club will be formed, and the training received by the members of the club will be the very important part of the program. A motion picture machine will be secured to show educational films. A high school club will again be formed. Winter hikes, including sleigh riding and skiing are being planned. Not only will there be a father and son banquet, but also a mother and son banquet. Marksmanship among the boys will be established, and the competition in this sport is expected to be decidedly keen.

One of the best winter programs that has been known has been arranged by the physical committee. Dr. S. D. Bell, chairman of this committee, stated that there will be medical examinations, and the very important part of the program. Two sessions a week for gymnastic work, basketball, hockey, basketball, indoor baseball and aquatic teams will be chosen, and the totals of these teams will be under the C. S. E. T. and the Canadian hexathlon. He said that London has an enviable position as being the hexathlon club of Canada, and that the best of boys must be got in order that the club can still retain the title of being the championship club of Canada for hexathlon clubs. Boxing and wrestling tests will be given, and considering that this is the first time these tests have been brought into the "Y." is sufficient to show that all will take an active interest. A manufacturers' amateur athletic association will be formed in the early part of the winter, so that it can get away to a better start than it did last year.

Education Object.
The industrial department has undertaken an entirely new kind of work for the winter. Education will be its chief object, and it is expected that the religious committee will work in conjunction with it. R. P. Liddle, secretary of this department, is sparing no effort to carry out his plans. He is going to work among the men of the factory much more than he has done in previous years. He will endeavor to educate the working class by different ways, and explain to them the importance of the education of their children.

Social Evenings.
The social committee will develop an atmosphere of friendliness so far as has not been attained. Almost every evening will be set aside for some club of the "Y." to have a social evening. More evenings for ladies will be arranged. This season is recommended by the chairman of the evening, William Gray. Sing songs will be held each Sunday evening after the majority of the churches are out. Skating parties and billiard and chess tournaments will form a part of the winter's program.

A. V. Dewberry, who was recently appointed military secretary, said that he is going to get each one of the members of the R. C. R. which is coming here in the form of a letter in favor of retirement from the rectorship of Rev. P. Mayes. Mr. Mayes is to leave St. Mark's Church not later than February 1 next.

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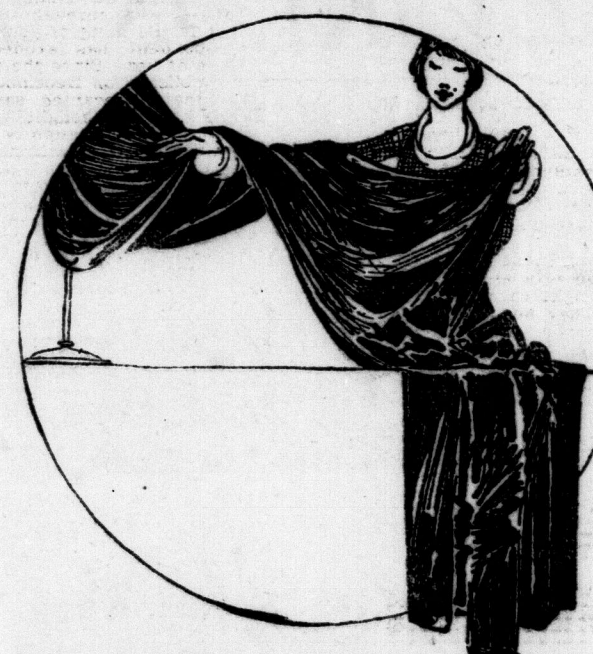

STOLEN AUTOS ARE SOLD IN EUROPE

Six Detroiters Arrested—Cars
Shipped Valued At
\$200,000.

DETROIT, Sept. 21.—Charged with shipping more than \$200,000 worth of automobiles stolen in Detroit, through eastern ports to Scandinavian countries, six Detroiters persons, one of them a woman, have been arrested here and are being held by federal authorities under the Dyer interstate automobile theft act, it was announced today.

Those arrested were Almon Beeden, 30; Belle Warner, 24; William Halpin, 30; Joseph Gallo, 25; Douglas Moore, 24; and Henry King, 19. Three men now serving a sentence in the state penitentiary at Jackson, following the arrest several months ago, are alleged to have stolen the cars on the streets here during a period of a few months. The cars, it is said, were sent overland to eastern ports by those who now under arrest here, and shipped to Norway, Sweden and Denmark, where they were sold.

DESCENDANTS OF CREW OF THE BOUNTY GET MAIL ONCE A YEAR

Community of Tristan d'A Cunha the Loneliest in the World.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—(By Canadian Press).—The loneliest people in the world, the inhabitants of the little island of Tristan d'A Cunha, in the South Atlantic, will shortly learn something of the big movements of the outside world when the annual mail reaches them.

Two mail bags containing letters and other packages addressed to the settlers on the island are placed on their way to Cape Colony. Thence they will be conveyed by H. M. S. Dartmouth from Simonstown to Tristan d'A Cunha direct.

Many of the settlers are descendants of the crew of the Bounty, who landed on that lonely coast but eventually grew to like the place. Incidentally a British garrison was maintained as a sort of warden of the ocean area until after the death of Napoleon at St. Helena.

Cattle and sheep raising, poultry farming and vegetable growing, with ample fishing facilities, make up an ideal sort of existence of the Robinson Crusoe type.

LEO VOLL FOUND GUILTY OF INTENT TO INJURE WOMAN

Gave Mrs. Antoinette McGaffney Bottle of Whiskey and Carboic Acid.

KITCHENER, Sept. 21.—A verdict of guilty of intent to injure, grievous and annoy was brought in by the jury tonight against Leo Voll of St. Agathe, who last March 2 gave a bottle containing whiskey and carboic acid to Mrs. Antoinette McGaffney of the same village. In view of the evidence by the young woman as to the accused's good conduct and character, a rider was added urging clemency for the prisoner.

Justice Lennox adjourned the court until a further date, having granted the defence counsel's application earlier in the afternoon for a stated case, when for the third time the court changed the indictment against the prisoner, his counsel claiming that the case should be dismissed.

WARSAW, Sept. 21.—Polish success against the Bolsheviks is reported on the southern and central fronts, where the eastward advance of the Poles has been continued.

In Galicia the Poles have reached the Zbrucz, and now control the western bank of the river. Northwest they have occupied Rovno, giving them the triangle
