



MOTOR BUS WILL BE ON STREETS OF **LONDON ON MONDAY**

Here On Exhibition From Akron, Ohio-Will Carry Ninety Passengers.

The first "real" motor bus ever brought to London will be on exhibition next Monday, Ald. Harley said today. It was built by the Goodyear Tire Company of Akron, Ohio, and it is not for sale. If citizens are sufficiently impressed with it, however, to vote for the establishment of an auxiliary transportation service here the plans and specifications will be turned over, and the city can have the buses built wherever it pleases. ever it pleases.

It was hoped to have it here this week, but the drivers were not willing to leave before Christmas.

Filled to capacity this monster automobile holds ninety people. Its main feature is the fact that it has six wheels eliminating much of the strain which usually falls on the two rear wheels of a car its seating capacity is forty-four. usually falls on the two rear wheels of a car. Its seating capacity is forty-four. It has a 70-horsepower motor, and can attain a speed of 25 miles an hour. It requires headroom of about seven feet, and a turning radius of 35 feet.

The seats are upholstered with D'arcy springs. Half of them are placed lengthwise and the other half crosswise. The bus is roomy, and permits passengers to carry parcels and suitcases. It is equipped with variable springs at the back, which makes for easy riding when not fully loaded, and with long, easy springs at the front. A tandam rear axle gives additional easy riding facilities.

The six-cylinder motor is properly muffled and carried on a flexible subframe separate from the main frame to make the passengers unconscious of the presence of the motor in the bus. A constant mesh type of transmission makes for noiseless and positive speed changes.
