SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE The Sao Paulo Tramway, Light & Power Company, Limited

Report of the President and Directors for the Year End-ing 31st December, 1907, Submitted at the Seventh Annual Meeting of the Shareholders, Held on Wed-nesday, the 29th Day of April, 1908.

On behalf of your Board of Directors, I have pleasure in submitting the Seventh Annual report of the Company, for the year ending 31st Dec., 1907.

It shows gross earnings of \$2,111,523,14, as compared with \$2,018,703.92 for the previous year, an increase of \$92,819.22, and net earnings of \$1,395,873.50 compared with \$1,368,162.77 during 1906.

Out of gross earnings there have been applied to:

Operating and Maintenance charges

Bond Interest, Government and Municipal Taxes, etc

Three Quarterly Dividends of 2 per cent. each and one of 2 1-4 per cent., aggregating

Of the balance, there was placed to the credit of Contingent account \$100,000, and to the credit of Profit and Loss there was carried the sum of \$244,974.52. The policy inaugurated several years ago of setting aside a portion of the year's surplus to credit of a Contingent account, for the purpose of meeting extraordinary outlays for replacing and renewals, was maintained during 1907, when there was placed to the credit of this account the sum of \$100,000. Of the amount credited this year \$25,902.53, together with \$106,171.47, the amount at the credit of this account at the close of the year 1906, was expended upon the property in renewing sections of the Transmission Line, portions of Track, Overhead Lines, etc., leaving a balance standing at the credit of this account at the end of the year of \$74,097.47.

In addition to renewals and replacements referred to the Company has maintained its system in excellent condition.

maintained its system in excellent condition.

LIGHT AND POWER.

In this department the demand for Light and Power is increasing very rapidly. In addition to the light and power to be supplied Sao Bernardo (to which reference is made later) progress is being made in the illumination of the city streets, are lamps having been placed upon several of the fusiness thoroughfares. There are now in use 45,570 are and incandescent lamps, compared with 38,179 in 1906, an increase of 19.5 per cent., while the number of customers shows an increase of 57.

As in the Lighting Station, the Power Department is also showing gratifying increase. The number of customers on the Company's register at the close of the year was 310, as against 245 at the end of 1906. The motors installed increased by 108, the Horse Power contracted for shows an increase of 1102 1-2 H.P., and the prospects are that for the present year there will be continued increased demands upon our plant.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE.

Continuing the construction of the Santo Amare Reservoir, enlarging the Power Station and additions to the Hydraulic Plant at Parnahyba, extensions to Tracks, etc., necessitated the expenditure of \$743,871.88.

Reference was made in our last Annual Report to the work of constructing the Santo Amaro Reservoir. Owing to difficulties in obtaining satisfactory little to certain portions of property adjacent, which it was necessary to secure, the work of construction was somewhat delayed; but the Engineer in charge reports that the work is progressing most satisfactorily and that the Reservoir will be completed and ready for the storage of water by the 1st of June next. A contract has recently been placed for the seventh unit, which should be ready for operation before December, 1908. Contracts have also been placed for the necessary transformers, switch-boards and other apparatus required for the utilization of the current from this seventh unit, both at Parnahyba and the sub-station at Sao Paulo.

ROLLING STOCK.

The demands upon the passenger service necessitated an increase in our Rolling Stock. There were twelve cars constructed during the year in the Company's shops and orders have been placed for the necessary material for twenty-nye additional.

The Company acquired by purchase the rights and property of the Santa Anna Railway, a narrow gauge mule line extending from the terminus of one of our trunk lines at Ponte Grande to Santa Anna, a distance of between one and two miles. While the operation by mules has been very profitable, as soon as same is electrically operated, much larger returns will be obtained.

The Company has recently secured an exculsive 30-year concession for the distribution of light and power in the municipality of Sao Bernardo, including the town of that name, distant ten miles from Sao Paulo. This concession will prove of great value to the company, as this municipality is a manufacturing centre. The Company has already secured favorable contracts for power in this locality and a large increase in the demand seems reasonably certain.

At a Special Meeting of Shareholders called fo the purpose, on the 27th day of December, a Bylaw was ratified and confirmed, authorizing the increase of the Capital Stock of the Company from \$8,500,000 to \$10,000,000; the issue to be used from time to time as the demands of the Company require.

LOCAL CONDITIONS.

During the past year both State and Municipal Elections have been held.
The newly-elected President, or Governor, will hold office during the next four years. In the municipal election Dr. Prado was again unanimously elected as Prefeito, or Mayor, of the city.

All vouchers and accounts for the year have been audited and the Balance Sheet duly verified by Messrs. Clarkson & Cross, Chartered accountants.


