YORK AND SCARBORO FARMERS ARE UNITED

Big Meetings Decide to Oppose
Cut in Price—Fire in Earl-
court—Rally in W. Toronto.

Two largely attended meetings of York and Scarborough township farmers were held last night to discuss the milk situation, and the reduction in the price per can of ten cents made by S. Price & Sons, the big city dealers.

The meeting was held at Wexford and the Don Schoolhouse respectively and were each marked by great enthusiasm.

All the producers on the leading roads were represented, and it was decided to withhold the supply of milk until the dealers withdraw the reduction and live up to the agreement made last October, which was \$1.55 per eight-gallon can for winter delivery and \$1.25 for summer. This contract was for one year. The two meetings represented over 200 cans daily.

WEST TORONTO.
Big Laymen's Banquet Promises to Raise \$6000 for Movement.

WEST TORONTO, Nov. 30. — "A splendid banquet, with a splendid lot of men gathered together for a splendid purpose, and with every anticipation of splendid results," was Mayor Baird's description of the monster banquet held in the basement of Victoria Presbyterian Church to-night in the interests of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

In his opening remarks as chairman, Mayor Baird stated that the laymen of West Toronto could, without the slightest inconvenience, easily take upon themselves the financial burdens which the movement will incur.

The address of H. N. Rowell, K.C., was listened to with the greatest attention by the large audience. "This is the first time," said he, "that all the Protestant denominations of Canada have united in a common cause. It is a very significant happening, and is the first of its kind ever commenced by any country."

In response to the appeals made to-night, a resolution on behalf of the Protestant churches of West Toronto, proposed by Dr. Perfect and seconded by Principal Colbeck of the collegiate institute, was adopted unanimously: "That whereas the membership of the Protestant churches in West Toronto purposes last year \$22,140, and only \$22,140 for foreign missions during 1908."

Following Mr. Rowell, an eloquent address was given by Hon. A. B. Morine, K.C.

The clergy of nearly all the Protestant churches in town were present, including Rev. Dr. Pidgeon of Victoria Presbyterian Church, Rev. Dr. Hazlewood of High Park Avenue Methodist Church, Rev. Dr. Beverley Smith of St. John's Episcopal Church, Rev. A. N. Simpson of the Disciples of Christ, Rev. John Locke of Davenport Methodist Church.

Mayor Baird proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Dr. Pidgeon for the use of the hall, and to the ladies of Victoria Church for the magnificent banquet which they provided, as well as the courteous manner in which they catered to the wants of all present.

EARLSCOURT.
Big Meeting Endorses Union and Wants School Limits Enlarged.

EARLSCOURT, Nov. 30. (Special.)—A large public meeting have been held in Earlscourt, but to-night's meeting was the largest yet held in the district. Every available seat in the large school room was taken, and large numbers were standing before the meeting commenced. It was expected that some members of the Toronto board of control would be present, but none appeared.

Mr. Robinson, president of the Ratepayers' Association, presided, and stated that the meeting was called at the instance of the board of control to fix the boundaries of the district to be annexed to the city.

The executive had prepared questions for discussion, each one of which would have been enough for a night's debate.

Solicitor Wants Terms.
Solicitor Rowe who drew the petition for W. H. Edwards of Brantford, re fixed assessment, contended that there should be no disparagement between the large and small owners. If the district could get a fixed assessment for a term of years he would favor annexation, otherwise he would oppose it.

Deputy Reeve Nelson stated that the township always tried to do the fair thing to all districts with the means collected from the ratepayers. He the question of annexation he said that the council are neutral on the question. As a private citizen he advised that they remain with the township for a while longer, and Reeve Henry and Deputy Reeve Watson each spoke briefly. Reeve Henry discussed the pros and cons, summarizing the question very fairly, at the same time stating that the policy of the council has always been to steer a neutral course in the matter.

West All the Section.
A resolution was finally adopted and will be submitted to the board of control strongly favoring the taking in of the remaining portion of school section No. 13, from 200 feet north of St. Clair-avenue.

During the progress of the meeting to-night fire broke out in a large frame house near the corner of Main and Derby-avenue, belonging to Mr. Cooper. RIVERDALE IN EARNEST.
R. Home Smith Addresses Fine Meeting in East End.

Speaking before the Riverdale Ratepayers' Association in the R.C.Y.C. Clubrooms last night, R. Home Smith gave a most interesting and instructive address along the line of the railway, dealing more especially with regard to park extension and improved drainage.

A prominent member of the Guild of Civic Art, Mr. Smith stated that his views, while on some points not wholly in accord with the guild, were in the main identical.

Resolved into concrete form, it is proposed to utilize as part of a comprehensive plan the Hamstead Park, from the lake shore to a point north of the city. In this connection Mr. Smith stated that, as a resident, he in that district, he in common with others had already secured the property indicated, and that he was holding it in trust for the city pending some comprehensive plan. Controller Ward's sea wall came in for strong commendation, as did the tunneling of the western gap and the acquisition of the waterfront as far as the Scarborough Bluffs.

EXPOSURE AND FIRE WRECK UPPER FLAT

Employees of Harvey Quilting Co.
Have a Lucky Escape From
Serious Injury.

When a blaze starts off from an explosion which knocks the roof off and the wall out, the firemen have to do some hustling.

That's what happened at 10:43 a.m. yesterday, when combustion among feathers blew up the top floor of the fourth-of the Harvey Quilting Company, at 33-37 Pearl-street. Fifteen girls and ten men employed in the building escaped unhurt, the considerable frightened. Four girls employed in a dye works across the lane shed a narrow escape, a portion of the debris crushing an 8-foot hole thru the roof. The noise of the explosion was terrific.

Bay-street firemen were on the spot and at work inside of four minutes. Chief Thompson was close behind them, but was in vain in his attempts to throw ladders up by the shouts of people round about to keep his men away from the building. The men did the work, nevertheless, and the fire didn't get out of the flat it started in. Water in plenty was received. The loss to contents is about \$15,000, and the building \$7000; covered by insurance. Alexander & Cable and the Toronto Dye Works suffered some loss also. The walls of the building may have to be torn down.

The high pressure system was not needed, two engines being sufficient. The narrow thoroughfare prevented the use of the aerial trucks or water-tower.

Town of North Toronto
Court of Revision re Local Improvement.

Take notice that the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of North Toronto intends to construct the following local improvement works on certain streets within the limits hereinafter described, to-wit: (a) Six-inch water main, hydrants, valves and other necessary connections, along and under Bowwood-avenue, from a connection with the water main at its intersection with the easterly limit of the Bowwood-avenue, to its intersection with the easterly limit of the Bowwood-avenue, and (b) A gravel and gravel sidewalk, 4 feet in width, with necessary grading, upon and along the southerly side of Bowwood-avenue, from a connection with the terminus of the present sidewalk at the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 28, eastward along the southerly side of said Bowwood-avenue, to its intersection with the line of the easterly limit of Lot No. 25, according to Plan M-30, a distance of 200 feet, 3 inches, more or less.
