STEAMER SENLAC SUNK BY STEAMER ROSALIND

She was Rammed in Halifax Harbor During a Dense Fog -- Crew and Passengers Rescued and Wreck Towed to the Shore and Beached -- Was Valued at \$100,000 and Well Insured.

Halifax, N. S., July 1.—Just off Meagher's Beach, within the limits of Halifax harbor, the steamer Senlac, bound out, collided with the steamer Rosalind, bound in from New York. A dense fog prevailed and the accident seems to have happened through some mistake in signals.

The Senlac had three passengers and 35 of a crew, all of whom got aboard the Rosalind after the collision. She found her way out of the harbor and toward the shore. The Rosalind, however, being unable to get away quickly from her position, she was forced to beach.

FOUR BITTEN BY DOG IN CARLETON

Bull Dog Ran Amuck on Ferry Floats Yesterday Afternoon.

Three boys and a girl were bitten by a bull dog said to be owned by Walter McLeod, of Carleton, Monday afternoon and while the animal was being beaten first off one and then another of those it attacked excitement ran high.
