BREWERY INVESTORS COMBINE Will Seek Protection of Interests in Event of Prohibition

New York, July 24.—Arthur J. Westerman, a lawyer of 30 Nassau street, announces the organization of the National Investors' Protective League to protect the interests of investors in breweries whose investments are in danger of being wiped out by prohibition legislation. Although incorporated as a membership corporation under the laws of the state of New York only last week, the organization already has sent two bulletins to senators and representatives.

Mr. Westerman said in explaining the objects of the new organization, "we only ask compensation."

Mr. Westerman asserts that there is \$1,500,000,000 invested in brewery securities in the country held by 60,000 investors, and that they have never had any say in legislation heretofore. He explained that with whisky out of the market the saloons would have to close, for they could not make a profit on beer. This would wipe out the breweries and their securities would become valueless.

The board of directors for the first year consists of Mr. Westerman, H. G. Ramsperger, J. G. Ramsperger & son, exporters; William Cooper of Cooper & Forman, manufacturing jewellers; Henry Von Twicken, a real estate insurance man, and D. Basse, a retired merchant. The organization will issue a journal and will have legislative agents in congress and every state legislature in the country. Mr. Westerman predicts that within a month more than 15,000 members will be enrolled in the league.

FISHING PROFITABLE IN NEWFOUNDLAND THIS YEAR


St. John's, N. F., July 24.—"Home fisheries" are playing an important part in the commercial life of Newfoundland this year. Prices for all fish products have risen to such unprecedented proportions that inhabitants of the long shore line have realized the possibility of making a substantial addition to their income by putting in an hour or two of fishing every day. It is no unusual sight to observe whole families going out in rowboats in the evening and returning with a good load of codfish caught within a mile or two of their homes.

In the casualty lists yesterday appear the names of six well known New Brunswick men who have given all for king and country. L. D. Baird, who is reported killed in action, was a former C. P. R. employee and gave up a good position to enlist. He attended the P. S. I. school here and enlisted with the 115th Battalion.

Lieut. R. Evans, of Hampton, appears as wounded in the night of July 18. He is a son of Thompson Blair and began his service in Fredericton with the 140th Battalion, being drafted from England to France where he joined a New Brunswick battalion. His father and one sister, Mrs. Edward Dupluis, of Fredericton, survive.

Weeks enlisted in the ranks and has distinguished himself greatly in the present fighting. He won the Military Medal and then a bar to it before finally winning his commission. His friends in the city will be pleased to hear of his creditable record.

Lieut. Ronald Stewart, R. F. C., passed through the city last evening. He left here with the Divisional Signaller under Major Powers in August of 1914 and has been decorated among a select number of fellow Canadians with the Russian Order of St. George. He received a commission in the R. F. C. on his arrival in France and is now on his way to take up his duties as instructor in the aviation school at Toronto. Lieut. Stewart has just returned from a tour of distinguished conduct on the part of Lieut. Weeks for which it is thought that the Military Cross has been awarded.

"SKY-LINE" LOGGING METHOD OF WESTERN CAMPS
In the logging camps of Oregon and Washington a "sky-line" method of logging is proving much cheaper and more efficient than the former method of dragging out logs from the forest by a donkey engine and cables operating on the ground. The sky-line plan is to run

a cable through blocks or pulleys suspended at a great height on trolley trees, so as to form a sort of trolley line, by which the logs are hoisted into the air and then hauled over the tops of ordinary trees and other obstructions to the railway, where they are loaded aboard freight cars for shipment. The donkey engine, which operates the sky line has five drums, including two for main lines and two for trip lines. The top cable, from which the log is suspended, is one of the main lines, while the other is used to haul the log. In operation the top cable is lowered with its block, or trolley, directly over the log to be picked up; it is then pulled taut, raising the log with it by means of a "chooker," or steel tong. In the air a log can, of course, be moved much faster than on the ground. An interesting illustration of this form of logging appears in the August Popular Mechanics Magazine.
