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THE WAR NEWS.

The press of Germany shows resentment toward the United States because the government of the latter country has intimated that it would not be wise for the Germans to sink an American ship in British waters without first making inquiry concerning the vessel and the character of her cargo.

There are 600,000 less people in Belgium than before the war began, and the whole 7,000,000 of the population are in serious want, with hundreds of thousands utterly destitute.

Having previously expropriated all stocks of corn, wheat and flour, the German Bundestaat has now expropriated the stock of oats, and has also ordered the breweries to reduce their production.

UNIFORM PROVINCIAL LAWS

Uniformity in provincial legislation in Canada is greatly desired by all who have business transactions in different provinces, and also lawyers, who now find it necessary to have a knowledge of the laws of all provinces, as well as of the Dominion.

An address on this subject, delivered by Sir James Aikins, president of the Canadian Bar Association, in Winnipeg, in December last, and is being distributed by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, which is asking the re-organization of the principal boards of trade and other public bodies in each province.

A precedent has been established in the United States. Twenty-five years ago the American Bar Association began an agitation which resulted in the creation of a Board of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, appointed by the governments of the respective states, to make a study of the comparative laws of each state, and to make recommendations. This board has not only gathered information, but has had standard forms of acts relating to the several subjects on which uniformity is desired drafted by experts.

address the association unanimously adopted, as an expression of the feeling of representative business men of Winnipeg, a resolution requesting boards of trade and other public bodies in Canada to memorialize the governments of the different provinces praying—

1.—That the representative governments cooperate with the governments of the other provinces to standardize laws affecting financial and commercial transactions.

2.—That the respective governments each appoint a commissioner or commissioners for the purpose of conferring with such representatives from other provinces to obtain this result.

3.—Or in the alternative, that the respective governments commission the Canadian Bar Association to report upon the subject and that an appropriation be granted for that purpose.

The tributes paid to Rev. G. A. Kubring by the officers and members of his own congregation, and his co-workers in the Anglican ministry, give expression to a feeling of universal respect and esteem which he has won not only as the pastor of St. John's Church, but as a citizen of St. John.

They had a war scare at Ottawa last night. The rumor that hostile aeroplanes from New York state were moving toward the capital caused a general excitement of lights and special precautions and preparations for an attack which failed to materialize.

The Socialists of the allied countries agree that German militarism must be crushed, and they demand that in the readjustment of national boundaries after the war the feelings and desires of the people of Poland and of other smaller states be considered and respected.

The St. John Standard several times recently featured alleged statements by Mr. Turgeon, M. P., in which he was represented as raising objection to Canadian participation in Britain's wars. A correspondent of the Telegraph who heard Mr. Turgeon's speech, says that he has been misquoted and misrepresented, and that no man in northern New Brunswick has done more than Mr. Turgeon to encourage young men to enlist, and to encourage the people to support the various patriotic funds.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, in his pastoral letter, declares himself strongly against the use of intoxicating liquors, and especially, in this time of war, against the habit of men of squandering in liquor the earnings which may be sorely needed for the maintenance of their families. It is interesting to note in this connection that a deputation from the Ontario Young Menhood Association called last week upon Premier Hearst and his cabinet and urged the abolition of the retail sale of liquor, as a war measure. The example of Russia, which abolished at one stroke all traffic in liquor, was held up as a model. Premier Hearst replied that the government had been giving very careful consideration to the whole question, and promised that legislation to minimize the effects of the liquor traffic would be asked for, although he pointed out that conditions in Ontario were quite different from those in Russia, and intimated that his government was not considering so drastic a measure as total prohibition.
