Uniformity in provincial legislation in Canada is greatly desired by all who Uniformity in provincial legislation in Canada is greatly desired by all who have business to transact in different provinces, and also lawyers, who now find it necessary to have a knowledge of the laws of all provinces, as well as of the Dominion. A strong movement to bring about greater uniformity has been inaugurated by the Canadian Bar Association, and its action has been endorsed by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, which is asking the ro-operation of the principal boards of trade and other public bodies in each province.

An address on this subject, delivered by Sir James Aikins, president of the Canadian Bar Association, in Winnipeg, in December last, has been printed in pamphlet form and is being distributed by the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association. Sir James Aikins pointed but how desirable it is in the interests of banks, manufacturers and wholesale merchants, as well as lawyers, that there should be a uniformity in provincial legislation, and that one of the purposes for which the Canadian Bar Association was formed was to bring about this desired result. Lawyers of all the provinces are thus interested in the work, which can only be done with the concurrence of the several provincial governments and legislatures.

Premier Hearst replied that the government had been giving very careful consideration to the whole question, and promised that legislation to minimize the affects of the liquor traffic would be asked for, although he pointed out that conditions in Ontario were quite different from those in Russia, and intimated that his government was not considering so drastic a measure as total prohibition. Negotiable Instruments Act has been adopted by forty-six states, territories and federal districts and possessions; the Warehouse Receipts Act by thirty states; the Bills of Lading Act and the Sale of Goods Act in eleven states; the Certificates of Stock Act in nine states, and several others in a number of states. The work is being continued, and Sir James very properly says that what the United States has done Canada can do; and, as a matter of fact, there is more uniformity in Canada at present than there was in the United States before there was in the United States before they began to adopt standard acts. After discussing legislative jurisdictions in Canada as between the federal and provincial authorities, and dealing with a number of questions and showing clearly the inconsistencies and contradictions in provincial laws, Sir James made a very strong plea for the adoption of standard acts, or failing this that Dominion legislation be secured. 
