Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.
A person who is the sole owner of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon acquisition of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Conditions—In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

WALL STREET EXPERTS ON THE OUTLOOK

How J. S. Bache & Co. and Henry Clews View the Situation in the Stock Market—Business Conditions

New York, Aug. 27.—The money situation from now on will command considerable attention as the movement of currency to the west and south has begun. The New York banks are beginning to make large loans to their interior correspondents and the annual statements of the New York banks must from now on begin to decline, affecting business and security conditions throughout the country for a time.

The Bank of England's official rate did not advance this week, but discount rates were strong, being 4 per cent. above the bank rate, which latter will probably be raised next week to 3 1/2 per cent. The official reserve increased, but by reason of an increase also in liabilities the proportion of reserve to liabilities declined to 62.62 against last week's 53.19.

The tenacity of the crop corn in many sections will soon begin to cause anxiety on account of food danger and, in fact, the news gatherers and news makers have already started shivers in some parts of Nebraska. It is, however, a little early for worry of this character, and as to the earliest attempt at getting new crops, there is still a disposition to wait in the portion of Nebraska where the cold wave is reported.

Reports of earnings of the railroads for the month of July will be available about the 1st of September. It is to be expected that the net earnings of the railroads for that month, which are ahead in nearly all cases of those for the same period last year. The net earnings for the month of July, in so far as they have been reported, show that they will run slightly ahead, but not as much as in the month of June.

General business is quiet near normal, with a better outlook in iron and indications of gain during August in some of the large steel plants.

The basic unfavorable conditions remain, inflated currency, small trade balance, high commodity prices, continued extravagance, and the grip of the Sherman Act. Crop time being, and securities held temporarily should be sold on advances.

New York, Aug. 27.—On the stock exchange a somewhat unsettled undercurrent prevails. Speculative conditions seem somewhat conflicting. The railroad problem is still a factor in the market, and indications of gain during August in some of the large steel plants.

The question as to whether the railroads may or may not advance rates has fortunately been postponed until after the elections, when the problem free from the suspicion of playing politics. Very soon numerous operators will have returned from their vacations, refreshed and invigorated by rest and change of scene. Naturally they will appear in a strengthened and more optimistic state of mind, the effect of which will undoubtedly be felt in the stock market. There has already been a sharp recovery from the low point of July, which, as usual, induced a certain amount of profit taking; but prices of the better class investment stocks are already upon a comparatively low basis. Indications point to an irregular market for the next few weeks, with politics, crops and money as the chief influences.

Party of 150 Back to Canada—One Brings Twenty-Five New Settlers With Him

"Yes, I have brought back twenty-five emigrants with me," was the proud boast of one of the party of the Sons of England, who returned to Canada on board the steamship Royal George last night after a tour of seven weeks in the old country. I made a wager on leaving Canada for this trip that I would not be content with bringing back one, as I had promised, but I would bring a dozen. However, I have more than doubled that number, and I can say many more will follow. I am bringing these twenty-five to Brampton, Ontario, as they are all mostly machinists. I have work waiting for them there, and more for those who will follow.

Many more of the party had brought back with them from one to five friends to Canada, and they say that the seeds sown by them in the different spots of England they visited will bear fruit in the increasing numbers which will emigrate next year, when their preparations are completed.

All were gratified at the reception accorded them in England. When they landed first at Bristol, the lord mayor welcomed them, then on Bristol several of the number went to their own homes, but the "Conduct Party" had a well planned pilgrimage, and travelled in special cars.
