

This number is expected to be reduced by several last minute scratches. For the race at a mile and a quarter, and carrying an added purse of \$50,000 and a gold cup, the overnight entries are Pompey and Bubbling Over, favorite and second Bubbling Over, favorite and second choice, respectively. The other fifteen, any one of whom might come through the race to immortal fame, are: Boot to Boot, Light Carbine, Rockman, Bagenbaggage, Take A Chance, Blondin, Champ De Mars, Espino, Recollection, Canter, Display, Bolton, Rasuli, Rhinock and Roycrofter.
