**TEDDIES ON
SKATES IN BIG
TOY CARGO**

Germany Sends First Con-
signment for Christmas—
Waddling Ducks, Dolls
and Submarines that Dive
Under Water in Bathtub
Included.

Germany's first large shipment of
Christmas toys, 3,000 cases, arrived in
New York this week on board the Or-
duna of the Royal Mail Line, which
sailed from Hamburg, stopping at
Southampton. Almost every type of
toy that ever fitted into a stocking or
stood beside the fireplace on Christmas
morning was represented. Officers of
the ship, who made inquiries in Ger-
many, said that the hummers of the
toymakers in the Black Forest are tap-
ping overtime in prospect of an Amer-
ican toy market equal to or even great-
er than that of pre-war times.

"Germany's toy industry has experi-
enced a remarkable recovery," said E.
T. Chamberlain, the purser of the Or-
duna, "and the makers are turning
hopeful eyes on America. Most of the
European countries cannot afford to
buy toys, and credits are tight even
in England."

The only other country to which any
of the cargo was transhipped was
South Africa, for which the Orduna
dropped 323 cases of toys at South-
ampton.

Deep in the hold of the vessel the
toys were buried, but the barber had
loaded up with a supply of samples to
work on the 620 passengers who made
the voyage. Mechanical animals pre-
dominated in the assortment and they
were geared and motored with clock-
work inside of them that made them
do strange things such as no toy ani-
mal ever did before.

There were teddy bears that wobbled
about on roller skates, tumbling bears
that turned somersault after somersault
across the floor, monkeys that propel-
led themselves with the shimmying swing
of real monkeys, big bullfrogs with
red high outs, phenomenal hopping abili-
ties, and deep booming voices.

There were geese that honked, ducks
that quacked, swans that sang, and
clucks that clucked and flapped their
wings as they scuttled along. The dolls
were well represented, dolls with flaxen
hair and blue eyes of olden days, dolls
with chubby cheeks and long eyelashes.
They still cry "Mama" when tightly
hugged and close their eyes when laid
to rest. Some of them even walk stiff-
ly with outstretched arms.

The following receipts are put in with the hope that they will prove of service and make this
page one to be looked forward to each Friday.

BROWN BREAD.
2 cups graham flour.
2 cups white flour.
1/2 cup sugar (brown or white).
1 teaspoon soda.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 cup seeded raisins.
2 cups sour milk or buttermilk.
Mix salt and soda with flour, add
other ingredients. Bake in moderate
oven 1 1/2 hours.

CHOP SUEY.
1 onion.
1/2 pound steak.
1 tin tomato soup.
Large cup cooked macaroni.
Slice onion in buttered pan, put
meat through chopper and season.
When cooking stir constantly. Add
soup and macaroni. Serve with toast
or baked potatoes.

DEVILED BEEF.
Slice cold beef into thin slices, spread
with butter and prepared mustard,
sprinkle with salt and pepper, pour
over it 1/2 cup vinegar, and let stand
10 minutes. Heat whole in a frying
pan with a little butter. Thicken
with flour and water, and simmer a
few minutes. Serve with baked pota-
toes.

STUFFED APPLES.
Hollow out the cores of good bak-
ing apples and stuff with mixture—
chopped dates, nuts and figs. Bake.
Serve with whipped cream and cherry
on top of each.
Good for Halloween.

STEAMED PUDDING.
2 cups flour.
Salt.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
Water to make batter.
Put apples, jam or any kind of fruit
in bowl and cover with batter and
steam. Serve with sauce or whipped
cream.

PEPPERMINT FUDGE.
Two cups of soft brown sugar,
Three-quarters cup of cream,
And butter size of walnut.
Give richness in extreme.
Boil these till thick and creamy,
And meanwhile stir it all
Until a bit in water dropped
Will form a waxy ball.
Then just before you take from fire,
Vanilla bear in mind,
And oil of peppermint, also,
The strongest you can find.
Now beat until it's sugary,
Pour onto buttered plate,
Then cut in squares.
When cool you serve
A tid-bit up to date.

EGGLESS, BUTTERLESS CAKE.
1 cup brown sugar.
3-4 cup lard.
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg.
2 cups raisins.
1 cup water.
1/2 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
Boil together for two minutes. Cool.
Add teaspoon of soda dissolved in hot
water, 2 cups of flour sifted with 1/2
teaspoon baking powder. Bake in slow
oven.

CAKE MADE IN A HURRY.
2 cups flour.
1 egg.
1 cup white sugar.
1 cup milk or water.
2 teaspoons cream of tartar.
2 teaspoons melted butter.
Put all together in bowl and beat
until light.

War and the progress of mechanical
industry have also left their mark on
the toys. Airplanes and submarines of
the latest type are seen in miniature,
bearing in their lines the influence of
the latest inventions of Fokker and
principles of the gliders that a few
weeks ago soared over the Ruhr valley.
The submarines are long, wicked look-
ing things that will plunge below the
waters of the bath tub.
But the trains, trolley cars, radios,
motion pictures, "musical" instruments
and Noah's arks of peace outnumber
the military toys and many of the
cases bore the mark "fragile, glass"
that hinted of the glittering wonders to
glorify thousands of Christmas trees.
Among the toys there were five un-
happy passengers who but a few years
before were children themselves. The
oldest was only twenty-one years of
age. They were stowaways—a butcher
and barber who stole on board at Ham-
burg and a tailor, a steward, and a
Scottish farmer boy who somehow slip-
ped aboard at Southampton. They had
counted on Christmas in America, but
there seemed to be little chance of it.
for the officers of the ship were talk-
ing about locking them up while the
vessel was in port, perhaps putting
them in irons. The company is fined

and they have to be taken back.
