## American Tribute To Viscount Bryce

(New York Evening Post.) When Gladstone died James Bryce wrote a sketch of his character, ending with the words "The light has died out of the sky." Something of this feeling touches Americans today as they read the death of the Englishman who was their best interpreter Bryce seems to Americans like a more unassuming critic. It was not the making magazines but Bryce that first held up to the public gaze the political life of our country. The secret of our admiration for this foreign observer lay in his unique combination of insight, frankness, and friendliness. He neither shrunk from our faults nor failed to acknowledge our virtues. As a result he won the rare triumph of seeing his portrait in America accepted by Americans as the authentic picture of their civilization.

One of the hall-marks of what passes for liberalism just now is to despair of the republic. Every survey of us by our own professional surveyors shows us to be bankrupt intellectually and hopelessly generally. Bryce had no more faith for this cheap pessimism than he had for unthinking optimism. "A hundred times in writing this book," he remarked in the opening pages of "The American Commonwealth," "have I been disheartened by the facts I was stating; but a hundred times has the recollection of the abounding strength and vitality of the nation chased away these tremors."

He was even capable of the scandalous admission: "There are elements in the life of the United States which may well make a European of this country, and dwell there rather than in the land of his birth." His latest view of the country, undertaken for what he rightly supposed to be the final edition of his great work, modifies some of the harsher lines of the earlier presentation. These changes are not due to a less critical temper; they register the observer's conviction that a generation had wrought perceptible advances in American life.

Bryce's interest in democracy did not stop with its most ambitious manifestation. His last work, "Modern Democracies," turns the same clear-eyed vision upon half a dozen experiments that range from the United States to the farthest reaches of the world. It, too, puts facts in the foreground and is cautious in drawing conclusions, but it leaves the same final impression—that democracy is neither a divine magic nor a devil's incantation, but a human institution, an institution at which the seasoned traveler looks with sustained hope.

Bryce had the happy fortune of an ideal personal relation to the people that he had made the subject of prolonged and delightful study. If every nation could send to every other nation an Ambassador who understood and loved his country as Bryce understood and loved his, the world would be a different place. Bryce's five years of official residence in Washington crowded his life with a closer approach, a spiritual entente between the land of his birth and the land of his adoption. No greater force for Anglo-American harmony could be imagined with Bryce there could be neither patronizing nor obsequiousness; there could be no sacrifice of either to a blind prejudice. Bryce was a true patriot of his own land and at the same time a friend of all lands. Nationalism and internationalism found no cause for quarrelling in the mind or the life of James Bryce.

His Great Career. To Americans Viscount Bryce was known as James Bryce. He was born at Belfast, Ireland, on May 10, 1858. His father, James Bryce, was a Scotchman, his mother was an Ulster woman. His father being an L.L.D. of Glasgow, it was natural that the son should receive his early education first at a high school and then at the University of Glasgow. He showed a vigorous understanding, gained a scholarship at Trinity College, Oxford, taking his bachelor's degree in 1882, and being elected a Fellow of Oriel.

His literary life opened in 1884, when he published a prize essay on "The Holy Roman Empire." The book was well received, and later was translated into German and Italian. The success of this effort led many of the young scholars to believe that history would be his ultimate aim, but this was not the case. In fact, his design was to make himself proficient in the study of law, and to this end he worked both at Oxford and at Lincoln's Inn, in London. At the unusually early age of thirty-two his ambition was rewarded by a chair in his own university—that of civil law.

He became an active member of the Alpine Club. In 1887 he had scaled the Malindang. One year he visited Spain; on another occasion he ran through Transylvania and Poland; in 1893 he published in the Cornhill Magazine his "Impressions of Iceland," an article which attracted considerable attention. Perhaps the most interesting of his traveling experiences was his tour in western Asia, in 1896.

Climbed Mount Ararat Alone. It became almost an article of faith with the Armenian Church that the snow-capped Mount Ararat was inaccessible. Mr. Bryce set out to conquer the peak on September 11, 1896, under the escort of six Cossack troopers, and beneath such tropic heat as he had never before endured. One by one his Slavonic attendants, as well as his Kurdish guides, forsook him, and at a height of 15,000 feet, Mr. Bryce found himself ascending alone. He accomplished the ascent, of which he gave a picturesque account.

Although Mr. Bryce turned aside from historical research to law, he soon made his political ambition evident, for

## POINCARÉ FAVORS WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Wonderful Advance in the Woman's Movement in the Last Year.

During 1921 the woman's movement throughout the world has made tremendous strides. Indian women in the states of Madras, Bombay, Travancore, and Cutch have been enfranchised on the same terms as men; the General Council of the League of Nations has elected its first woman member; parliament in Canada has elected its first woman member; the woman's movement in Belgium has been elected to the dominion parliament; and women have also been elected cabinet ministers in Canada. Mrs. Anna Wickham has been appointed a member of the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations. In China, Japan and the whole of South America the woman's movement is growing stronger daily; and there is a strong suffrage organization in all the unfranchised European countries.

Madame Spaak has been elected to the Belgian senate, and is therefore the first woman member of parliament in Belgium. Canada has elected its first woman member of the dominion parliament, Miss McPhail, member for South East Grey.

Mrs. M. C. Wilson has been elected mayor of Germiston, South Africa—the first woman mayor in the Union. Mrs. Wilson, though announcing herself a convinced woman suffragist, has refused to introduce a government bill for women's suffrage.
