BASKETBALL

International League.
New York, Dec. 10.—The club owners of the new international league held the first session of their annual meeting here yesterday and will reconvene this afternoon. All of the clubs were represented. With the exception of John Dunn of the Baltimore Club all the owners said they were ready to continue next season and all were optimistic. Dunn, however, said that in case the national commission, at its annual meeting in Cincinnati next month, failed to eliminate the drafting of players by major leagues, his club would not go through another season.

President-Treasurer Farrell's report of the 1918 season was adopted. In it the executive recommended that a committee be appointed to fix a club salary limit based on the receipts and disbursements of the season. The limit now adopted by the American association is \$8,000 a month for each of its clubs.

There was a long discussion in regard to the finances of the Hamilton, Ont., club, which was transferred from Syracuse last season, but no decision as to where the club will be located during the coming year was made.

Schneider Is Bought.
New York, Dec. 10.—It was officially announced here yesterday that Manager Higgins of the New York American League Club had purchased Peter J. Schneider, pitcher from the Cincinnati Club, with which he has been playing since 1914.

resting figures relative to the latent water powers in the province of New Brunswick. There was in this province 900,000, twenty-four hour water power; and of this vast amount only 18,900 had been developed. On the St. John there were three undeveloped water powers which could provide for eight months of the year 162,000 twenty-four hour horse power and this was three times as much as was used in the city of Hamilton and vicinity. At other points in the province there was over one hundred and twenty-five undeveloped water power. If these

were advertised, the money would be forthcoming to develop them and provide cheaper power for the manufacturers.
