There is said to be some hesitancy on the part of local bandsmen, many of whom contend that it would be difficult to adopt a fixed scale for engagements for their class of work. Others favor entering the association, pointing out that bands in other cities are affiliated with unions and have a regular scale of prices covering all kinds of engagements.

CLEMENCEAU ON FREEDOM OF SEAS

Paris, Sept. 26.—(Reuter's)—Following is the official text of Premier Clemenceau's reference last night to Great Britain and the freedom of the seas.

"As regards the freedom of the seas, England has no need to demand it of anyone. She already had it and there was none to dispute it. I have already told in this very place (and you applauded me) how I related to President Wilson a conversation I had with Premier Lloyd George on this subject.

"Mr. Lloyd George said to me, 'Do you recognize that without the British fleet you would have been unable to continue the war?'

"I replied, 'yes.'

"Then Mr. Lloyd George said 'Are you disposed to prevent us, should the case arise from doing the same thing again?'

"I replied 'No.'

"I reported this conversation to Mr. Wilson and he was not at all troubled by it. Mr. Wilson said 'I have nothing to ask of you which could displease or embarrass either of you.'

The British evacuation of Archangel has been completed with the exception of two hundred Highlanders, who will embark today.

LIQUOR POLICY TO BE DECIDED ON

Two important items among other matters will come up at the meeting of the provincial government on Wednesday in Fredericton. These are the matter of the government's policy regarding the control of the sale of liquor and the question of power supply on the Nepisquit River by the Bathurst Lumber Co. The application of the company will come before the meeting of the government for its approval. The power is to be for supplying the pulp mills of the company. It is very likely an important statement on the liquor question will be made by Premier Foster and a definite course adopted upon by the government as to the control of liquor sale.
