THREE CHARGES.

WOOL CASE GOING ON.
The trial of the case King vs. Hartin, charged with the theft of wool belonging to the Colonial Hide Company, was taken up in the court this morning before Mr. Justice Chandler and the following jury: John Armstrong, Christopher Spilane, Charles Berry, T. More recently he had been transferred to the firing line again. In letters received from him a day or two ago, he wrote, on May 28, that he had just come back to rest billets, and on June 5 he wrote that he was going up to the firing line again. Apparently he never returned from that trip. Before going overseas he was employed with the Thompson Manufacturing Company at Grand Bay. Besides his wife, he is survived by one child, also his mother, Mrs. Mary J. Gram of 56 Metcalf street, one brother, John, and two sisters, Mrs. Samuel Deahoy and Mrs. J. McEachern, all of this city.
