A SCIENCE OF GIVING?

(Boston Herald)

No less an institution than the Carnegie Corporation raises the question, "Is there a science of an art of giving?"

Having given away \$58,000,000 in eleven years this great foundation might be assumed to speak with some degree of authority on the subject. That the question is raised in the annual report issued today is significant, for during the last year the Carnegie Corporation has disbursed over \$5,000,000 among a large number of beneficiaries, and its assets will soon amount to \$146,000,000, all to be administered generation after generation by boards of trustees for the general purposes under the will of its founder, now well understood by the public.

The present report devotes ten pages to a discussion of the question of such trusts that wishes to do its work well, to do good and not harm, to help wisdom of the distribution of wealth through continuing trusts. Present-day economists are more liberal in their opinions, yet there are students of society today who hold that "the man who has amassed great wealth does better to use that wealth in the ordinary developments of trade and commerce than in attempting to perpetuate his own conceptions and desires for human betterment by the formation of a permanent trust." Thus this great agency for the giving away of a vast fortune raises the issue and at least justifies as respectable the position of those who hold that the capitalist who makes money is not thereby proven to have no interest in his fellow-men and their welfare.

But conditions today offer sounder justifications for the creation of such trusts than did any earlier epoch. The Carnegie trustees in their twenty years of experience have found that the great evils pointed out by Turgot and Smith were not entirely visionary. The trustees of today have to shoulder the burden of the future administration of such a trust, and when the early enthusiasm tends to wane they must replace the original administrators with new men who grasp the purpose and see the vision of its founders; by then the original administrators are dead.

A charitable foundation "becomes inevitably the Mecca of all solitons." The trustees therefore must without the temptation to dissipate resources in numerous mediocre projects. The trustees of today have to shoulder the burden of the future administration of such a trust, and when the early enthusiasm tends to wane they must replace the original administrators with new men who grasp the purpose and see the vision of its founders; by then the original administrators are dead.
