

LIBEL CHARGE IS MADE IN COURT

Mrs. Florence McLellan Begins Action Against J. L. Jacobson.

John L. Jacobson was arrested last evening by Sergeant Detective Power and Detective Biddiscombe as a result of information given by Florence McLellan, wife of George McLellan, who charged him with defamatory libel. The case was taken up in the police court this morning. Daniel Mullin, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and S. H. Hinton for the defendant. The information was not read in open court and it was announced that the case would be taken up as a preliminary hearing this afternoon. The defendant in the case is said to be a native of Cape Coast and is an out-door patient in the Lancaster Hospital. It is alleged that he wrote letters in which were contained charges against the character of the plaintiff.

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FIRST C. P. STEAMER AT QUEBEC TODAY

Four Thousand Passengers on Quebec Vessels Due There This Week-End.

Quebec, April 25.—Nearly 4,000 passengers are carried by four Canadian Pacific steamers due to reach this port over the week end. The largest single complement is that of the Metagama, from Glasgow and Belfast, due here early on Sunday morning with 288 cabin and 1,190 third class. On this steamer there are almost 1,000 passengers who are entitled to the \$15 bonus on arrival in Canada.

The first of the C. P. R. fleet of St. Lawrence route ships to arrive here, however, will be the Minnedosa, from Southampton, Cherbourg and Antwerp, and according to latest reports, expected today, her passenger list is composed of 250 cabin and 854 third class. Among the latter is an empire settlement party of 30 prospective Canadian citizens.

Both the ocean steamers are expected to dock on Saturday. The Montclair, formerly the Empress of Britain, is expected early in the morning and the Montreal at 6 p. m. There are 185 cabin and 588 third class passengers on the Montclair, and the Montreal carries 396 third class only.

Among them are 22 Regan Home Boys who will remain here for Toronto. After disembarking their third class quotas, the Minnedosa, Montreal and Metagama will proceed with their cabin passengers to Montreal.

The immediate effect of the conference breakdown may be a resumption of clashes along the border.

London, April 25.—The failure of the Irish boundary conference here yesterday is widely regarded as likely to develop a serious crisis. It is generally taken for granted that the British Government will act in the matter by appointing a commission to delimit the boundary between northern and southern Ireland and it is believed the Free State Government will, if necessary, press this.

The question, however, arises whether, since Ulster has refused to appoint a representative to the commission, that body could legally operate with only two members instead of the three provided for by the Anglo-Irish treaty.
