

KENT M.P. DENOUNCES KING GOVERNMENT

A. J. DOUCET IS CRITICAL OF LEGISLATION

Declares Little of Importance Done in Sixteen Weeks of Present Session

TAKES FLING AT PETERSEN CONTRACT

Charges Duplicitous and Lack of Veracity in Carillon Power Matter.

MONTREAL, May 21.—Denunciation of the Federal government, accompanying a review of legislation at the present session, was the keynote of an address delivered here last night by A. J. Doucet, M. P. for Kent, N. B.

Other speakers of the evening who dealt briefly with general issues, were Hon. Rodolphe Monty, Hon. Andrew Flett, and L. J. Gauthier, former member of parliament for St. Hyacinthe-Rouville.

REVIEWS HOUSE ACTION

Opening his address Mr. Doucet said that although the House of Commons was in its sixteenth week, little legislation of major importance had been brought down.

Reviewing the Petersen contract, he said the evidence before the committee had shown that while the contract was supposed to have been based on the Preston report, the latter had come after the former was signed. In the matter of the Preston report Mr. Doucet asserted that during his seven months abroad, Mr. Preston had not even visited the steamship companies he condemned.

CHARGES DUPLICITY.

The speaker touched on the Carillon Falls power matter, asserting that in this connection duplicity and lack of veracity reigned at Ottawa since a proposed contract was produced knowledge of what had been previously denied.

All Night Session of British House Ends in Row; Closure Is Applied

Mob of 5,000 Men Attempt Jail Delivery of Two Negroes in Texas Town; Five Wounded

CANADIAN PRESS. DALLAS, Texas, May 21.—Five men were wounded when a mob made a rush on the Dallas County jail early today, in an effort to take Frank and Lorenzo Noel, negroes, charged with murder and criminal assault. Officers guarding the jail, met the rush with a volley of shots.

About thirty shots were fired, most of them into the air.

The attack promptly subsided, after the first volley, and members of the mob fell back a distance of a block or more.

The crowd began gathering early in the night, and by midnight had swelled to 5,000 or more. Police and firemen established lines around the jail building and the latter had kept the crowd at a distance by playing streams of water upon them.

Inside the jail building Deputy Sheriff maintained a secondary line of defence. They were armed with shot-guns, fire hose, and supplies of ammunition and tear gas, prepared to repel any intrusion.

During his years at Mount Allison he has gained a reputation throughout the constituency as a brilliant speaker and has endeared himself to Allstonians everywhere, who will deeply regret his decision in this connection.

Dr. Wigle is looking forward to a year of travel and to publishing books which he is now preparing.

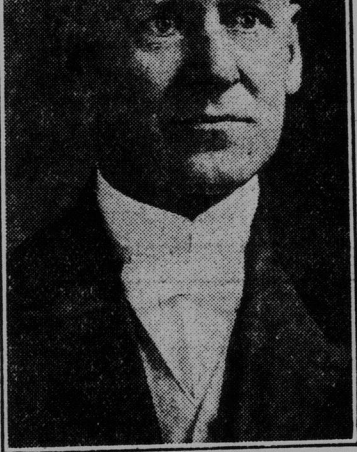
