The Chatham Presbytery held its regular session yesterday in the lecture hall of St. Andrew's church. Those present, Rev. Dr. McIntyre, of Amherstburg, moderator; and Rev. Messrs. Tolmie, Windsor; Radford, Blythwood; McGregor, Harrow; McLaren and Jamieson, of Blenheim; McInnes, Puce; Munroe, Ridgeway; Mustard, Kent Bridge; McClintock, Dover; Cowan, Dawn; Dr. Butcher and F. H. Larkin, Chatham, and a number of lay members.

Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Perth, agent of the 24th century fund, addressed the meeting upon the subject, and it was decided to make a canvass of the Presbytery in the interests of the fund.

Rev. J. M. McLaren, of Blenheim, was unanimously chosen as moderator for the ensuing half year.

In the afternoon conveners of the standing committees were appointed as follows: Sabbath School - Rev. W. M. Fleming, Blythwood; Aged and Infirm - Rev. D. Currie, Walkerville; Augmentation - Rev. J. C. Thimie, Windsor; Home Missions - Rev. Dr. Butcher, Chatham.

The call from the congregations of Valerita and Fletcher to Rev. Mr. Quarry, of Hamilton Presbytery, was received and sustained.

Brief reports were rendered by those appointed by the Presbytery to visit the augmented fields.

An adjourned meeting of the Presbytery will be held on Oct. 3, the next regular meeting will be held in Ridgeway on the second Tuesday in December.

A DRINK OF WATER.

It Was Exchanged For A Farm of 640 Acres in Texas.

A section of land which constitutes one of the best farms in the fertile Brazos bottom of Texas once sold for a drink of water.

It was about 50 years ago, according to ex-Lieutenant Governor George T. Jester, that a crowd of frontiersmen from off the Brazos came to Corsicana on a trading expedition. Corsicana at that time was not as great a town as it is now, but was a typical frontier village or trading post.

The grandfather of Governor Jester was a Methodist circuit rider and lived at that time in Corsicana. He occupied a two story double log house. His house was a rendezvous for people from far and near, who came trading. In those days land certificates were used as circulating medium, as money was rarely seen.

One occasion a whisky drinking character from off the Brazos arrived in town, got on a drunk and at night was put to bed in the second story of the Jester mansion. About 1 o'clock in the morning he awoke with a terrible thirst. No water was in the room, and he could find the way down stairs. Sticking his head out of the window, he saw some men asleep in the yard. He called to them to bring him a drink of water, but no one answered him. A second and a third time he called, with no response. Finally he yelled out:

"One of you fellows bring me a drink of water and I'll give you 320 acres of land." This aroused the sleepers, who called back that he wouldn't climb those steps for 320 acres of land, and the offer was raised to 640 acres. The man under the tree drove a bucket of water and handed it up stairs and offered a dipper to the toper, but he pushed it aside. "Give it to me out of the bucket like a horse," he said, and he put about half the contents of the bucket in his belt.

In those days a Texan's word was his bond, and this fellow kept his word about the land. Next morning he made his benefactor a deed to 640 acres of Brazos bottom land. This land still belongs to the descendants of the water carrier and is one of the finest farms in Texas, and is all Texas. It is now worth from \$35 to \$40 per acre.
